the municipality.

According to the Executive Summary of the Committee's findings presented Councillors on Monday morning by Tom Vendrasco of the Clarington's by-law enforcement office, "the committee reviewed in length the specific issues brought before Council and general issues involving firearms and safety and found no safety issues".

Clarington's Firearms Safety Committee was given the mandate to review current municipal by-laws related to the use of shotguns and high power rifles and address the safety concerns of the community.

Clarington's by-law which regulates the discharge of firearms states that firearms with a calibre not greater than .275 may be discharged on Agriculture and Environmentally Protected lands and that a set back of 300 metres is required.

According to Vandrasco, the committee found that this "firearms by-law is adequate to further protect the public from the use of firearms."

The make-up of the Firearms Safety Committee was suggested by staff once council approved the formation of the committee. It was suggested that the committee be made up of a representative of the police, Ministry of Natural Resources, Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, farmer, trapper, member of Council, member of the Municipal Law Enforcement Division and three citizens from the Municipality.

Eric Atkins and Richard

Stephenson were two of the "citizen" three members appointed to the committee. They were also part of the 6th Concession delegation that appeared before council last March expressing their concern with rifle on the crown lands near their property. They also reported an incident last January where a hunter was on their property with a gun.


Councillor Robinson who was the Councillor appointee to the Committee reported on Monday that Atkins and Stephenson attended the first committee meeting and never came back.

Stephenson said in a phone conversation with the Times on Monday evening, "We resigned when we realized that our vote would be out weighed." Everyone else on the committee was involved in the use of firearms said Stephenson. He said they left their suggestion

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with the committee, "that perhaps use of long range rifles is not a good idea in a growing community, and it was up to them to address that issue."

The Committee did recommend that better mapping be incorporated with the current By-law so as to clarify where firearms may be discharged.
