


Cobourg Business Report



Cobburg's name will come up in any conversation about the history rich towns of the north shore of Lake Ontario. Its early businessleaders constructed a commercial harbour, shipped rail cars of iron ore across Lake Ontario, and celebrated their confidence with the construction of marvellous examples of architegture.

he centrepiece of the town today is Victoria Hall, the grand creation of 1860 which embodied the enthusiasm of the townspeople that Cobourg would develop into one of the major cities of Upper Canada. Today we have one of the finest medium-sized towns with one of the bestpreserved Victorian-era main streets in the

province. Its large stock of heritage homes makes Cobourg a picturesque community in which to live. Though surrounded by new growth, its essence as a heritage community is intact.

Cobourg Mayor Joan Chalovich says, "With our healthy business environment, a supportive municipal structure, and an enviable lifestyle, we continually strive to have our community counted among the best in North America."

Cobourg is the county seat of Northumberland County, which abuts Durham Region to the west, Peterborough to the north and Quinte to the east. The widening of Highway 401 to six lanes has made Toronto an easy one-hour trip. The town also has Via Rail commuter service to the city. The business community is served by a well developed truck

transport industry, as well as by both CN and CPR rail services.

Cindy Symons-Milroy, the town's director of economic development, sees her job as "encouraging investment within the community and helping to create an environment that is conducive to the growth of new and existing businesses." Economic develop-

ment "is not just smokestacks," she says. "It's also making sure the necessities are available, which includes housing, recreation and education, so that lifestyle needs can be met."

The economic development office maintains an extensive data base on every aspect of the Cobourg area. An Economic Development Advisory Committee, made up of representatives from the private sector, maintains close ties

with the town's Chamber of Commerce, DBIA, local training board, personnel associations, and others.

Under an agreement with the provincial and federal governments, the town operates a Small Business Self-Help Office, which provides a library, counselling, and on-line access to information on funding, business plans, and marketing.

With a population of 16,000 and a diversified economy, Cobourg provides a workplace for 10,000 townspeople and residents of the surrounding area. "We are the economic centre of this region," Ms. Symons-Milroy says. More about the community can be found on the town's Web site at www.town.cobourg.on.ca

Dr. Doug Galt, MPP for Northumberland, describes the Cobourg economy as "a wonderful example of what's happening across Ontario: lower taxes, less red tape, a highly skilled and competitive work force." The town's location, within a two-hour drive of 40 million people, is "a huge advantage for businesses operating here," he added. "The town's quality of life is second to none, so it all adds up to a major advantage for someone looking to live, work, invest, or raise a family."

Tourism

During the 1990s, Cobourg was named twice in the Globe and Mail's Report on Business survey, first as one of the best towns in which to conduct business, then as a top-ranked lifestyle community. Then, in 1998, the town was judged most attractive Canadian community of its size in the Communities in Bloom competition.

Cobourg has abundant recreational opportunities. Residents take part in fitness programs at the YMCA, baseball at Legion Fields and Donegan Park, golf in town, or lawn bowling in Victoria Park. They watch the town's Junior A hockey team in action, play on the town's numerous soccer pitches, and sail from one of the best small-craft harbours on Lake Ontario.

The community's service clubs and social services organizations are exceptionally active. The Rotary and Lions clubs organize an annual Waterfront Festival on the Canada Day weekend, attracting visitors from near and far to an outdoor show of arts, crafts, musical entertainment, and a spectacular fireworks display. These and other clubs and organizations are the backbone of community life.

The arts community is also flourishing. Theatrical societies mount productions at the Concert Hall in Victoria Hall, a structure that also serves as home to the regional public art gallery. Cobourg is also home to a symphony orchestra and several choral societies. The town's modern library is evolving into the information centre of the community, with Internet services and an excellent reference capability.

The parks department and the town's local horticultural society are to thank for the colourful state of public parks and gardens. The centrepiece of their efforts is Victoria Park, where an illuminated brick walkway extends along the expanse of the public beach.

Visitors to Cobourg will also be impressed by the quality of its accommodation and dining facilities. A prime example is the Woodlawn Inn, a family-run restaurant and inn located in one of the town's most historic buildings, dating from 1885. "In the 1980s, as Niagara-on-the-Lake was being discovered by Torontonians, we knew it would only be a matter of time before the big city would extend its sights eastward," says innkeeper Stephen Della-Casa. "Cobourg, with its historic setting, waterfront location, and excellent rail and highway access, has what it takes to be a tourist destination." The Woodlawn Inn offers 14 luxu-

rious rooms furnished with period antiques, fireside dining, classic cuisine, and a relaxing courtyard garden.

earning is a lifelong exercise for residents of Cobourg. The town has three high schools, eight public schools, three private schools and five day-care centres and is serviced by several post secondary institutions.

Health is another area in which the town is abundantly served. The Northumberland Health Care Corporation hospital, located in Cobourg, includes a 24-hour emergency department, surgical, special care, pediatrics, obstetrics, as well as rehabilitation and palliative care. Physicians operate out of five clinics in town, and a wide range of other health-care professionals have offices in town. Cobourg is also home to six nursing and retirement homes.

Unlike many towns of its size, Cobourg enjoys an exceptionally low level of crime. Violent crime is a "non-issue," says Police Chief John Kay. He describes the town's police force as "modern, well equipped and well trained," thanks to the priority the town's elected council places on policing, and the support of the community. "It's a nice lifestyle when you can walk down the boardwalk at night with no fear for your safety," Chief Kay says.





hroughout the whirlwind changes of the past decade, Cobourg has had a stable housing market and steady growth of subdivisions and industrial, commercial, and institutional development. Jack Dupuis, an associate broker with Royal Lepage-Pro Alliance, attributes this to the "growth mode" the town has managed to maintain.

Two years ago, Cobourg acquired 1,700 acres from its township neighbour. This assures the town room to grow as residents of the Greater Toronto Area look farther affield. When people look to Cobourg from Oshawa, Dupuis said, they find that the same two-storey bungalow can be had for \$122,000 — a 30-35% saving. Royal Lepage-Pro Alliance, with 34 agents, is the largest player in the Cobourg market with a 29% share. It also has a keen interest in the town's stock of ICI real estate.

Between 1994-98, Cobourg issued building permits averaging \$18.5-million per year, and throughout the

90s new subdivisions have been staged at an even pace.

A study prepared for the town in 1997 as part of an official plan update predicts measured growth during the early part of the next century. The study projects housing construction will increase on average by 186 units per year through 2017. The employment forecast is for almost 5,000 new jobs during this period.



Manufacturing & Industry

ood processing, plastics and metal fabrication are the mainstays of Cobourg's manufacturing sector. The town is home to operations of Kraft, Weetabix, GE Plastics, Belden, Gaines, Casco, AAB Building System, Columbus McKinnon, Zircatec, Coca-Cola, Weston and Horizons Plastics, to name but some of the major players.

Industry in Cobourg has access to hydro on either 44-Kv or 27-Kv service. It can also draw on an eight-million-gallon-per-day-capacity water system, with more than 50% in reserve. The town is constructing a second water tower to serve its northern sector and is automating its filtration plant to produce an even better quality of water. "We have been very progressive in expending



money to improve the water system," says Public Utilities manager Bruce Craig. "The PUC has very low rates, which indicates we are running an efficient



operation as we enter a new, very competitive era."

Between 1993-98, Cobourg's manufacturing work force expanded by 20 per cent. "Cobourg has always been a very diversified and progressive community and is recognized as a leader in both business and industry," says Mayor Joan Chalovich. "The town is strategically located in Central Ontario to link into major Canadian

centres, as well as into U.S. markets."

Located in the Lucas Point Industrial Park, GE Plastics has been a presence in Cobourg for 34 years. Its Specialty Products and Services plant is a custom small-lot compounder of engineering thermoplastics resins and sheet materials. The production from its 16 extrusion lines is shipped by rail, truck, and air to international markets for the manufacture of automotive parts, telephone, computer and communication system housings, aviation fixtures, along with many other applications. The Cobourg plant has 200 highly skilled employees, dedicated to serving customers who include Northern Telecom, Boeing, Bombardier, Ford, and General Motors.

Belden (Canada) Inc. is a leading employer and corporate citizen in Cobourg. "Belden quality has no equal," is the motto at the 250,000-square-foot plant where electrical and industrial wire and cable are manufactured. The Canadian administration and sales staff are also housed there. Cellular manufacturing and a continental shift arrangement have increased employee productivity by 21%, and a safety incentive

program brought related costs down by 76%. A 4.8 Sigma customer comptaint satisfaction level is based on exceptional control of product quality, sales, and shipping. As a member of the United Way's corporate sector, Belden and its 270 employees in 1999 will contribute more than \$61,000, or 12%, of the county-wide campaign goal.

Genter Manufacturing, located in Northam Industrial Park, employs 93 people in tier-two manufacturing for the auto industry, specifically the metal frame of instrument panels for Ford. Seven robotic welding machines and their operators turn out these precision products, which are then shipped to nearby Port Hope, where Textron Automotive moulds the dashpoard and inserts the wiring. With head offices in

Michigan, Center's Cobourg operation also plays a role in the design and implementation of instrument panel changes. Center turns out 1,500 units per day. As a supplier in a dedicated manufacturing chain, "You can't afford a glitch," says the plant manager.

Lakeland, a family owned and operated multi-trade service company, was founded in Cobourg. A recent

expansion has doubled the manufacturing square footage, allowing the company to meet increased demand, especially for steel fabrication. Lakeland is one of a select group of companies certified for pressure welding. In addition to custom fabrication and machining, welding, millwrighting, and electrical services, it offers customized machine engineering and building; machine rebuilding and/or repair; robotic repairs; programmable logic control; and systems integration. A Lakeland maintenance program includes carpentry, painting and plumbing.

When it comes time to move a consumer goods product, the Cobourg-based Canadian Pallet Council provides direction for the pallet supply chain across the country. The not-for-profit Council's mission is to provide the most cost-effective standards for the distribution and exchange of pallet shipping platforms. To achieve this, it sets, monitors and enforces policies under which member distributors and suppliers share



Gaines Del Foods of its founder, Clarence Gaines Gaines Pet Foods produces semi-moist dog food and specialty treats, complete and balanced products that are easy for dogs to digest. Production from the Cobourg plant is sold under the trade names Top Choice, Nuggets, Nibbles, and Me & My Dog Treats. The plant also does custom packaging for a number of private label customers. Gaines also imports Dentacare brand bones from Gaines Ireland for the Canadian market. Shato Holdings of

Vancouver purchased Gaines from General Foods in 1982. With 90 employees, the plant operates 24 hours a day, five days a week, milling, blending, extrusion forming, packaging, and shipping its products across North America.
