Grafton Historical Notes

By T. R. M.

That the emigrants from the British Isles to the Canadas during the early years of the century did not soon forget the land of their birth is evidenced by the rapid formation of St. George's, St. Andrew's and St. Patrick's Societies. All three were in existence in the Newcastle District The St. Patrick's Society by 1836. had an Anniversary Dinner at Arkland's Hotel on March 17th., 1838. Dinner was served at 5.00 p.m. and all Irishmen were urged to attend. The Scotchmen, however, appear to have been the first to form a national society. On St. Andrew's evening, just a century ago, Pepper's Hotel, which (if our identification be correct) still exists as the "Mansion House" was the scene of mirth and good fellowship. The following excerpts from a more extended account of the proceedings are taken from the Cobourg "Reformer" of Dec. 2, 1834.

"On Monday evening last, the anniversary of St. Andrew, Scotland's Tutelar Saint, was celebrated by a public dinner, at Pepper's Hotel, Upwards of fifty gentle-Grafton. men, without distinction of country or denomination, from Cobourg, Colborne, and the neighbouring townships, sat around the festive board, at which harmony and good feeling prevailed during the whole evening. John Steel, Esq. was appointed President, and Mr. K. MacKenzie, Vice-President. After the cloth was removed, the president rose to propose the first toast, and spoke in substance as follows: --

Gentlemen-"It is with mlugled feelings of diffidence and delight, that I rise to address such a highly respectable and numerous company as the present.
