

Identity of found human skeletal remains still unknown

O.P.P. investigators continue their efforts to identify the human skeletal remains that were found on the Bruce Peninsula near Hwy. 6 at Dyers Bay October 13th, 2005. Dental charts were completed to assist with identification and for comparison purposes against all outstanding cases of reported missing persons. The Coroners Office in Toronto examined the remains and felt that the person was a male Caucasian, aged 20 years or older with good upper teeth that have several fillings. The lower jaw has not been recovered. Forensic anthropology assessment indicates the remains had been there for two years or longer. A large fixed blade hunting knife with the initial E.H. engraved in the handle was found along with gold framed prescription glasses. A separate pair of red lens sunglasses and a Players Light cigarette tin was also found at the discovering site.

Two pieces of clothing that bore the Canada Post logo were found at the scene and police continue to investigate that lead. Other clothing at the scene appears to have been purchased at Mark's Work Warehouse.
