A Harvard training plane, believed to be from the RCAF base at North Bay, made a forced landing about 1 p.m. Saturday in a field near the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Eady, North Horton.

A broken nose was suffered by the pilot and slight injuries by the other airman. The plane was damaged to the extent that it will have to be dismantled and removed by crasher float.

Provincial police from Renfrew set up guards until air force personnel from Ottawa arrived to take over the guard duty.

The names of the pilot and other airman in the plane were not available.
