## Monteith Milk Tests The Best

Monteith Industrial Farm had the most uniform milk quality among pasteurizing plants checked in September, October and November by the Porcupine Health Unit.

Tests are made on the basis of coliform count (cc) and standard plate count (spc.). An ideal standard, says the health unit, would be zero coliform and a standard plate count of 10,000 or less per millilitre of milk tested.

For Monteith, the three-month figures were, September through November, coliform count, 0.0, 0.0, and 1.50. Standard plate count was 3,000 for all three months.

#### EATING PLACES

All restaurant and other eating establishments were inspected last month, prior to advising municipal licensing departments about issuance of permits for operation in 1967.

Two houses were placarded closed during November, being unfit for human habitation due to structural defects, plumbing and dilapidated interiors. This restriction was lifted on another house which had been closed previously.

Annual school inspection program was completed in November. A total of 100 elementary

and secondary schools were visited, for a total of 1,057 classrooms occupied by 21,283 elementary children and 6,605 secondary students.

The schools were inspected for covered lighting, ventilation water supply, sewage disposal and general sanitation of premises and grounds. Defects were reported to respective school boards.

Tuberculin tests in which all beginners and those without record of previous testing were Cochrane and Smooth Rock Falls.

Three health nurses assisted at a CNIB clinic in Kapuskasing last month. Miss Elizabeth Atkinson attended a supervisors' conference in Niagara Falls. Routine visits were made to all outside offices.

Public health nurse interviews totalled 1,247 at home and 50 in offices. Maternal and infant welfare interviews predominated, followed by school, adult and pre-school matters.

Bacteriological tests performed on all municipal water were satisfactory during November. The unit noted that the Ontario Water Resources Commission has taken over Mountjoy Township's supply.

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
