

## Paving of Monteith road "in five-year plan"

It's hard to pin down highways officials on the subject of paving Highway 577 (the Monteith road) except it's in the five-year plan.

This is what Mayor Aurele Gervais reported after a meeting in Cochrane recently with D. S. Cornell, district engineer.

Council will "keep after" the department until the back road from Iroquois Falls to Monteith is paved.

A sign erected this summer on Highway 11 at the Monteith cut-off listed "Iroquois Falls" with an arrow toward Monteith.

Some tourists, who thought that must be the only way to Iroquois Falls, took the back road and later complained bitterly about its condition.

Council asked the Department of Transportation and Communication to remove the sign, and this was done.

When Mayor Gervais was in Cochrane, he and Mr. Cornell also discussed a possible new entrance off Highway 578 for cottagers.

Councillor Bob Cummings reported that 96 young people are involved in the minor golf program this year, compared with 42 last year.

He said that a fence should be erected to keep children off the roof of the small pump-house on Victoria Road. He is afraid that one of the youthful climbers may touch a live wire someday.

Councillor Nick Kuzmich reported that a new helper has started work in the electrical department. He is Robert Boucher.
