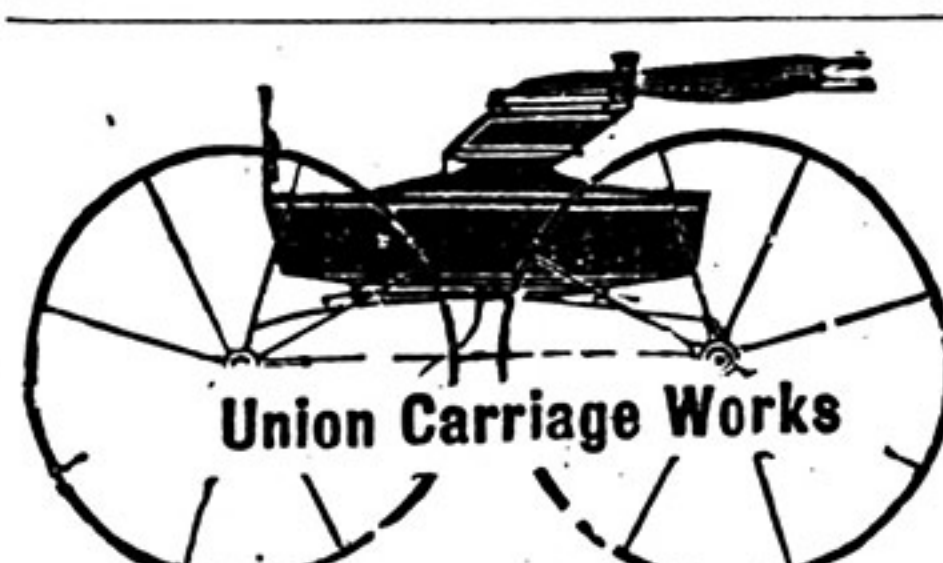

side in Chicago.

The Mail says in reference to the troops
at Niagara, for the time they have been un-
der instruction the band of the 31st is doing
remarkably well. In fact the whole battalion
is a credit to the county of Grey.

The total value of the product of the fish-
eries of Canada in 1882 was nearly seven-
teen million dollars.

Louis Riel, the leader of the rebellion in
the North-West some years ago, has returned
to Manitoba. His five years term of
banishment expired two years ago.

The House of Lords yesterday again re-
jected the bill permitting marriage with a
deceased wife's sister upon its third reading
by 145 nays to 140 yeas.

The Grand Trunk has commenced run-
ning fast trains to go forty miles an hour
between Toronto and Montreal.

The warehouse room of the Toronto Grey
& Bruce Railway Company, at Owen Sound,
has been more than doubled this spring, and
the company are now handling more freight
than any previous season.

worried recently.

Mr. F. Munro, who sold the Hanover
Post newspaper recently, has purchased the
Orangeville Advertiser.

The total membership of the A. O. U. W.
on April 1st was 119,089.

The Warton Echo has entered on its fifth
year of publication with fair prospects for
continued success, it is a tony, spicy sheet.

The Prince Edward Island and New Bruns-
wick Conference has adopted the proposed
basis of union by 40 to 28 votes.

Osprey.

There are two cheese factories in full oper-
ation, one at Wareham and the other at
Badgero.

The Presbyterians of Maxwell had com-

and brother for \$6,750.

Mr. W. L. B. Hamlin, Maxwell, has sold
out to J. Stinson & Co. who were recently
burned out.

Mr. John Miller, of Osprey, has bought a
lot in Maxwell, and is preparing to erect a
building for a store. It is thought Hamlin
has something to do with it though he is
bound not to start store for 5 years.

Mr. J. Kerton, has also sold his general
store, to Mr. Jas. Osborn of this Tp.

A few more changes and we will have a new
staff of business men.

Mr. Richard Davidson, of the centre line,
attempted suicide last Thursday morning by
cutting his throat with a razor, he was found
shortly afterwards, having bled profusely he
was about unconscious when found. Dr. Kerr
