U. S. A. BUYS
BRITISH TELEVISION

Britain's television industry has broken into the North American market with the sale of a complete television station to the U.S.A. This is the first U.S. order recorded by the industry. The station will be used for special industrial purposes in New York. The order results from an enterprising trip to the U.S.A. made by a team of United Kingdom technicians with five tons of television equipment, including a complete station designed to operate on the U.S. 525-line standard.

HE'S GOOD BUT DUMB.

WORLD'S MOST POWERFUL
TELEVISION TRANSMITTER

The world's most powerful television station was opened in Britain on Saturday, December 17. This new transmitter will add another six million potential users to those now viewing the regular daily programs transmitted from London. Situated some ten miles north of Birmingham, it has been planned by the British Broadcasting Corporation's engineers and is entirely equipped with apparatus of British design and manufacture. The tallest mast yet built in Britain supports a combined television and sound aerial. It is 750 feet high and weighs about 140 tons. The uniquely powerful vision transmitter is situated in the main hall of the building. When working at full power, it has an output of 35 kilowatts and the heat generated by the valves is carried away to warm the building in cold weather.
