Ethiopian Natives
Live in Mud Huts

Life in Ethiopia was described to the members of Greenock Women's Institute at their February meeting held in Greenock school with 20 attending. Mrs. Elva Pearson opened the meeting with a poem. Following the usual opening numbers, Mrs. Elwood Johnston read the minutes and encouraging treasurer's report. The roll call was a home hazard I should eliminate.

Consequently, it was decided to collect pennies for the Mental Health Association to be brought in May.

Reports of standing committees were good, especially Mrs. Hemley's report on education and Mrs. Patterson's on agriculture and Canadian industries. Mrs. Hemley spoke re radio programs and suggestions for praise criticisms, dislikes, etc. She quoted it is high time that parents took notice of what their children are listening to and one suggestion was for more Bible stories on Sundays for children.

Mrs. Patterson remarked that when the farmers' buying power slackens, it is soon felt in the cities; agriculture must make a fair income or the whole nation will suffer. Mrs. Pearson spoke re work and plans for the Elora Museum.

The directors of home economics and health, Mrs. C. Aitkens and Mrs. R. McKeown, called on Mrs. E. Patterson for the motto, The finest thing you can wear is your expression, so smile. She recalled the old adage, you can't smile and the world smiles with you. Weep and weep alone. A smile may make a New Canadian feel at home; a smile may make a stranger in church feel welcome; a smile from a store clerk may even help make a sale. A woman is never dressed until she has donned her smile.

Nancy Aitkens entertained the group with two instrumental numbers.

Mrs. McKeown introduced the speaker of the evening, Mrs. Ringer, whose subject was Ways of Living in Ethiopia. Though this country is in Africa, quite near the equator, the climate is fairly temperate. The homes of the natives there are mud huts made with thatched roofs put on framework of eucalyptus poles with just one room, dirt floors and crude furniture. The fire is built on the earth floor over which they cook, mainly flat cakes of millet flour and water. Pieces of these pan-cakes are sometimes wrapped around some stew made from goat or lamb and peas, leeks, onions, garlic and hot red peppers. This is very rich in vitamins and minerals.

There are many diseases because of filth and some malaria in low districts, typhus, leprosy, etc. Some of their medicines are made from certain trees.

At Addis Ababa where Mrs. Ringer and her husband were for some time, preventive measures were being taken under the World Health Organization, by inoculating against typhus, etc. TB clinics and day clinics. Hospitals sometimes handled 200 or 300 a day. Efforts were being made to teach the women how to keep clean, how to keep babies clean and how to properly feed them as the infant death rate is very high there.

Many samples of articles made in Ethiopia were displayed, such as spoons made of banana fibre, knives and spears with horn handles, ivory beads from elephant's teeth and a shield made from giraffe hide.

Mrs. Aitkens moved a vote of thanks to the speaker, and after the singing of the Queen, a social time was enjoyed.

HALTON FORUMS FEEL PRICE SUPPORT
VITAL TO PREVENT FINANCIAL RUIN

Satisfactory marketing of farm products, whether at home or abroad, to give the producer reasonable security and financial returns comparable to his labor and investments, is vitally important in these days of high living costs and keen competition. On Monday evening February 14, the farm forums in Halton county considered Farm Marketing Abroad.

Discussing the topic from the angle of price supports, there were varied opinions as to how they might be designed to protect the farmer. All Halton forums felt price supports were necessary to protect the farmer against financial ruin in case of a sudden drop in prices. This price should be high enough to encourage producers to improve quality and give him a reasonable profit but not high enough to ruin markets. Many forums regretted the fact that too often floor prices become the maximum.

Most groups agreed that these support prices should not be higher than available export markets.

What effect will price supports have on international trade? The majority of the forums felt price supports would increase trade barriers but others expressed the opinion that these would not result unless they were above world levels. It was suggested that trade barriers are essential at times to protect our own industries.
