PAVED ROAD NOW LINKS GLEN WITH GEORGETOWN

After being accustomed to a bumpy-bumpy-bump road between Georgetown and Glen Williams for many years, the local motoring public sighs with relief as they glide over the newly paved connecting link. So closely connected has the new road drawn the two districts that it seems only a matter of seconds when you go from one to the other. Then again, the pavement was extended from the 9th Line down King Street to Queen, thus eliminating another piece of bad gravel road that always seemed to be out of repair due to the heavy traffic in that direction. This latest improvement was made to a road which the motoring public of the town use a great deal and is greatly appreciated. The new pavement is of bituminous construction.

PROVINCIAL CONSTABLE COOKMAN ADDRESSES CIVIL GUARD HERE

With a good attendance present last Friday evening, Provincial Constable George Cookman, of Milton, addressed the local unit of the Halton County Volunteer Civil Guard at their regular drill in the town hall. Introduced by Lt.-Col. James Ballantine, who is commanding officer for the county, Constable Cookman outlined the duties expected of the Civil Guard should the need arise in Ontario. Being formed under the direction of the Attorney-General's Department as an aid to the provincial police, the Civil Guard has become a province-wide organization ready to protect life and property against any invader or saboteur and to assist in the keeping of law and order in war-time. Being organized now for many months, units in the lower end of the county are much farther advanced

than is the local unit. It is hoped, however, to have a large turnout of the Georgetown men at the church parade at Milton next Sunday afternoon, October 27th. Men in Georgetown and district, who are not connected with the militia, and wish to become a member of the Volunteer Civil Guard, may do so—and should be on hand on Friday evening for the final drill before going to Milton. The unit has received their quota of horses and should look smart on parade.

Following the address by Constable Cookman, Col. Ballantine continued the lecture on map-reading. Captain O. V. Williams was in charge of the drill.

Tuesday evening saw another good turnout, and new recruits present. The lecture on map-reading is becoming more interesting each evening, and in a few weeks Georgetown Civil Guard should be one of the snappiest units in the county.

LIONS CLUBS LEAD IN SEVEN COUNTRIES

Associated in Lionism today are over 3,850 chartered Lions clubs, with a total membership strength of 140,000, representing the business and professional ranks of the United States, Canada, Cuba, China, Costa Rica, Colombia and Mexico. In those seven countries Lions clubs are far in the lead, out-numbering the service club nearest in size by several hundred clubs and the third largest organization by nearly 2,000 clubs, says the secretary-general in the Lions International monthly letter.
