## To the Women of Halton County

Dear Sister Citizens:

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Halton County is taking this method of presenting for your consideration some facts, which it is urgently necessary for us as Canadian citizens to face at a time when waste of every kind is equivalent to giving aid to the enemy.

FACT I.

During 1939, the people of Canada spent for legally sold intoxicants approximately \$180,000,000, ALMOST HALF A MILLION DOLLARS A DAY.

FACT II.

On Page 7 of his booklet entitled "End This Colossal Waste," published in 1938, the late Viscount Snowden, a former Chancellor of the Exchequer of Great Britain, makes this statement: "The Liquor Control Board which was set up during the war, because of the havoc drink was playing in the restriction of output, made, through scientific investigations, a close examination of the effect of alcohol on physical efficiency, and arrived at this conclusion: 'A moderate use of alcohol lessens the efficiency of the workman by about 15 per cent.'"

FACT III.

Dr. Haven Emerson, Professor of Public Health Practice, Columbia University, in the preface to his book: "Alcohol, Its Effects on Man," says "There is agreement among students and teachers of the medical and associated sciences that alcohol impairs reason, will, SELF-CONTROL, judgment, physical skill and endurance."

FACT IV.

As has been already reported in the press, on July 24th last a deputation of church and Temperance leaders, representative of all the major religious denominations in Canada, waited upon the Dominion Cabinet urging immediate war-time restriction (NOT prohibition) of liquor sale, in the interests of national welfare. This matter is still being pressed.

FACT V.

Every citizen can aid this effort by writing a personal letter to Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of National War Services, Ottawa, urging that our government give immediate legislative effect to the restrictions referred to above.

We appeal to you the women of Halton County to do your part individually and through your organizations, to make known to the government your approval of the requests made by the above-mentioned deputation.

Roy R. Fleming, superintendent of the Guelph Parks Department, and one of Ontario's leading horticulturists died in Guelph General Hospital last Monday. Born in Orangeville forty-seven years ago, Mr. Fleming graduated from the Ontario Agricultural College, specializing in horticultural work, and his services were widely sought on parks and landscape projects throughout the province.

The funeral was held this afternoon from his late residence, Riverside Park, Guelph, with interment at Woodlawn Cemetery, Guelph. He leaves his widow, the former Lottie Carefoot, and two children, Robert and Donald. Mr. Fleming was a cousin of Miss Elizabeth Appelbe, of Georgetown.
