The Rotary Club of Acton announced the 23rd recipient of the Community Champion Award recently. This year's award winner was Arlene Humphreys.

According to a release, this award is "made in recognition of people who have demonstrated a 'heart for the Community of Acton'". The Rotary Club of Acton felt Humphreys demonstrated this through over 23 years as an active volunteer in Acton organizations, especially as Chair of the Acton Foodshare and a member of Heritage Actor.

"It's nice to be recognized, but it's really about

a group of people working together as volunteers and the community coming together to help those people in need," said Humphreys.

Humphreys has been a volunteer for more than 40 years. Upon moving to Acton in 1995, she continued her volunteer work with the "Girl Guides of Canada" both at the provincial and local levels until the early 2000s.

In 1995, looking for more involvement in the Acton community, she joined the board of the Acton Foodshare. By 1996, Arlene became the Foodshare Chairperson.

Over the last 22 years, she has guided the food bank through a period of substantial growth where the number of people supported has grown to over 400 adults and children representing about 200 Acton and area households. She has managed many relocations of the Foodshare and has been given the opportunity to be involved with a diverse group of dedicated volunteers in running Acton Foodshare.

"Arlene strongly believes it is important to recognize the support of the whole community of Acton and area," continued the release. "The dedicated volunteers of the Acton Foodshare and other local food security agencies have been key in providing for those people in need over the last 20 plus years."

Local Councillors file nomination papers

Clark Somerville filed to retain his seat as the Local/Regional Councillor for Halton Hills in Wards 1 and 2 on Tuesday.

Albano went on to say that as Councillor he will continue to work towards the betterment of Halton Hills, in collaboration with the BIA towards a revitalized downtown area as well as continuing to work towards new jobs and economic growth.

"As a lifelong Halton Hills resident, I take tremendous pride having the honour of serving on town council. I am an optimist who deals with issues and concerns in a sensible and realistic way.
