The 26-1-1 Bulldogs, who lost just once all season, led 9-5 early in the third period before the three-time defending-champion Shamrox rallied to tie the score at nine and force extra time.

The teams traded goals in the first OT period before 17-year-old Charalambides, who scored four times in the game and led the squad in the regular season and playoffs combined with 125 points, potted the winner after Halton Hills had just killed off a Clarington power play.

"It was a great individual effort by Adam," said head coach Kevin Dance.

"He beat the defenceman one on one and I can't remember exactly how it went in. All I saw the mesh move and then we all jumped over the boards. We had a great group of kids. The other teams were bigger and more experienced but our guys dug deeper."
