## 1973...in the news

- Following a two-year battle to keep it open, Halton School Board an-nounces Norval School is slated to close in June of 1974, as it only has 45 students. Chapel Street School will also close the same date, with 126 students in a school with space
- Halton's last Warden, Anne Mac-Arther steps down as Halton's first Regional Chair. Allan Masson takes over the position in the new year.
- North Halton Contact Centre takes its first calls giving distressed people a place to call for solace, information or simply a person to talk to.
- Claude Picket of Georgetown received \$29,000 for a Holstein cow consigned to the Sale of Stars at the Royal Winter Fair. Hillside Farms of Rhode Island purchased Pickland Citation Maria, a Rosafe Citation R daughter.
- It was announced that Halton County Jail will be closed in 1975, to be replaced by the new Maplehurst Complex. The Peel County Jail in Brampton will be phased out at the same time.

- After 35 years working at Georgetown Post Office, retiring Postmaster Harold Marshall was honoured at a reception. Marshall was Postmaster for 24 years.
- Acton Fire Chief Mick Holmes was chosen to be the new Halton Hills Fire Chief, over three other applicants.
- Region Councillors came under fire after they voted themselves a \$8,500 salary
