Locally based horticultural supply company Gro-Bark had one of its super-sized wood chippers— called a tub grinder- at the Robert C. Austin Operations Centre for a couple of days earlier this month to break down the massive piles of broken tree branches and limbs that have been brought to the works yard on Trafalgar

Town Superintendent of Public Works Dick Spear said that it's difficult to quantify just how much damaged trees

have been brought into the vard. Gro-Bark will invoice the Town by the cubic metre once the job is complete. Local residents are welcome to drop off the remnants of the Dec. 21 ice storm from their property at the Town's Trafalgar Rd. works vard at any time, which could take a few more months.

Municipal staff will break down the mulched trees so that it can be turned into wood chips and distributed to local residents for free at the Town's Earth Day celebration and tree sale on Saturday, April 26.





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
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Notification of bus cancellation on HDSB agenda

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Associate Director Jeff Blackwell told trustees at the meeting that currently principals use their discretion in dealing with the cold. They will consult with the Weather Network or other similar sources to get relevant weather information.

In times of extreme cold principals can declare an abbreviated outdoor recess or cancel it: they can extend their decision to other outdoor school activities involving their students as well, whether they take place on or off school property during.

In a later interview, Blackwell said he can recall very few times a principal has told him that a student might have suffered frostbite as a result of being outside in the cold during school hours.

Strachan's motion also noted that since school buses still run on some bad weather days there is always the possibility of delays, and if the temperature or wind chill is extremely cold students may be exposed for an extended period of time.

The Halton Region Health Department has criteria in place for cold alerts, which may be considered as part of the board's review. Also, the board's current inclement weather procedures don't make mention of electronic means of contacting parents under its communication of policy and procedures.

Several trustees alluded at the board meeting to the Halton Catholic board having a cold weather policy.

The Halton Catholic School Board does have its own practices related to extreme cold and

heat.

If the outside temperature, with or without windchill, is minus 15 Celsius (-15 C) or warmer, Halton Catholic board students can stay outside for all regular activities.

Between -15 C and - 20 C, students may remain outside for no longer than 20-minute intervals. If it's colder than - 20 C (-4F), students must remain inside.

At the other extreme, if external temperatures, with or without the humidex, are cooler than 35 C (95F) Halton Catholic students may remain outside for all regular activities. Between 35 C and 40 C, students may remain outside for no longer than 20-minute intervals. If it's hotter than 40 C (104F), students must remain inside.

In a related discussion at Wednesday's public board meetwhether transportation will run or if there will be any school closures is made by 6 a.m. at the latest on the day in question.

That information is sent to various designated local radio stations, is posted on the Halton Student Transportation Services website and is tweeted out by Halton board and placed on the board's website.

ing, trustees approved considering how to improve the timing of letting parents know about transportation cancellations or school closures.

Also to be considered will be recommendations on procedures regarding communication to parents when transportation is running and schools are open when the weather is only questionable or there have been cancellations in the previous day(s).

Currently, the decision as to

Strachan noted some parents are requesting that such information be made available to them quicker.

"They see information from other school boards and wonder why they have not been informed by HDSB," she noted in her motion.

Both issues are expected to be combined into an administrative procedure that will go back to trustees for information by late April.
