## Unique tea and fashion showjust in time for Mom's day

St. John's United Church is hosting a Trousseau Tea and Wedding Gowns through the Decades Fashion Show on Saturday (May 10), Mother's Day weekend. Wedding dresses, from the 1930s forward, including Janice Campbell's grandmother's gown, shown in this 1932 photo, will be worn.

Naturally, none will be worn by the actual brides, since who can get into their wedding dress? So far, 25 gowns have been assembled, but organizers are still looking for a WWII bride's attire, when women often got married in suits.

Many readers may not know what a Trousseau Tea is. The name comes from the French word trous-seau, which is a diminutive of trousse, meaning bundle. A traditional trousseau, stored in a hope chest, included brand-new outfits for a bride's wedding and honeymoon, including bridal accessories, jewelry, lingerie, toiletries and makeup, plus bed linens and bath towels for her new home. Traditionally, the "tea" was attended by female friends, neighbours and relatives, who came to ooh and ahh over the assembled treasures.

Naturally, males did not collect or display a Trousseau, because nobody cared what they were wearing. The last Trousseau Tea I went to was in the 1960s and was held for Patricia Hyde by her mother Helen. Quickly thereafter, Trousseau Teas fell out of fashion and they

seem quaint, or even ridiculous, today. Apparently, nobody wants to show off the undies they bought at Joe Fresh or the perfume they bought at Costco!

Still, it is fun to celebrate traditions from the past and historical fashions are always a hit, especially when tea and goodies are served. There are two seatings. The first seating for tea is at 2 p.m., followed by the wedding gown show at 3 p.m. The second seating starts with the wedding gown show at 3 p.m. and is followed by tea at 4 p.m. Tickets are \$20 each and may be purchased at Silver-Creek Cafe or the church office at 11 Guelph Street (905-877-2531).

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
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
