Homeless in Halton Hills It's not just a big city issue

It was just another typical evening for *Howard, a teen living in Halton Hills.

After hanging out with his buddy until bedtime, he gathered up a pillow and blanket and headed outside into the frigid winter air. As he created a makeshift bed in a car that belonged to his friend's parents, he started thinking ahead to where his next meal would come from and how he would get to school in the morning.

Like several other teens in the community, Howard was homeless. While one won't see local youth sleeping on street corners or begging for money, the problem is very real in Halton Hills, and is on the rise, said Links2Care Executive Director Kate Power.

"This is not a new issue," she said. "Numbers are certainly increasing, along with the complexity of the issues that surround youth who are homeless."

Since last April, Links2Care has assisted 31 homeless youths and six others at risk of homelessness in Halton Hills. Almost half of them slept outside at one point. During the previous fiscal year (from April 2013-March 2014), Links2Care helped 29 homeless youths and 10 at risk of homelessness.

Power said when "couch surfing," or short-term stays at the homes of friends, neighbours and other youth, is exhausted, homeless youth resort to other means.

"Youth stay at 24-hour fast food places, laundromats, inside clothing donation bins, under bridges and in forests and ravines," she said. "Youth go where they can stay warm and safe."

Most recently, Links2Care became aware of three youths in the community who were homeless and sleeping outside in the biting cold temperatures that have been par for the course this winter.
