## Makin' tracks on the slopes

The spirit of volunteerism is alive and well on the slopes of Milton, flourishing in a group named Track 3.

Track 3, with its head office in Etobicoke, is a group of volunteers dedicated to teaching young people with mental, physical and/or intellectual challenges how to downhill ski. People from the community give their time – and love of skiing – to make the community a better place to be. The organization is a success for all, especially the hundreds of young people who through the challenge of skiing have discovered that than can lead active, productive lives.

The name Track 3 came from the three tracks left in the snow by the one ski and two outriggers. Today, the name remains synonymous with skiing for people with disabilities. The program was funded by the Easter Seal Society but operated by a small group of volunteers. Since the program proved so successful to amputees, it was not long before children with other disabilities, such as spina bifida or cerebral palsy were introduced into the program. Instructor training methods were developed to teach the skiers, but the program reached a plateau for many years with a limited number of skiers, donated equipment and no formal training program for volunteer instructors.

To meet the needs of other youngsters who could benefit from Track 3, the core group of volunteers set up a separate organization in 1987 and incorporated as the Ontario Track 3 Ski Association for the Disabled. To obtain their new goals, funds had to be raised for equipment, a training program developed, and the development of a board of directors and large team

of committed volunteers.

Sara Lo Turco knows all about Track 3. She's an Acton resident and attends Robert Little Public School, and enjoys the outdoor benefits of the program. Patti Wilcox, an instructor who resides in rural Milton, heard of the program for several years from a board member that lived in Oakville. After moving to the Milton area and realizing Track 3 was operating at Glen Eden, she decided to look into it.

"The volunteers aren't all necessarily super-duper skiers. There's a large contingent of support staff. If someone would just like to help in the program, that's okay; the work entails a variety of things.

"Spokes and Slopes are working with us now. In the evening program we have a huge number of students, so it's a great help to have Spokes and Slopes out." One student that Wilcox worked with last year had obviously outgrown her skis, and the business was there to fit her with appropriate new gear.

Currently eight schools are in operation and a new phase has begun with the introduction of spinal cord injured children who are unable to support themselves. Technically sophisticated sit-skiis, bi-skiis, and mono-skiis have made it possible for them to take up the challenge of the winter outdoors.

However, to run successfully, the program needs the support of the community. It costs approximately \$1,200 to allow one youth to ski for one season. New staff are always welcome and full training is provided. 


