Cancer Society launches Daffodil fundraising campaign

The Canadian Cancer Society will be selling daffodils by the bunch in Wellington County and Acton to launch April's daffodil campaign. All month, volunteers will be going from door-to-door seeking donations for the Cancer Society. Funds raised will go to cancer research, transportation, information and support programs for people living with cancer, including support for families and friends. Last year, over \$330,000 was raised in Wellington County and Acton through the door-to-door campaign and close to \$10,000,000 was raised across Ontario.

The cheerful spring flowers will be sold at Greenscape Garden Centre and Nursery in Rockwood from Thursday, March 29 until sold out, and on Main St. in Erin this Saturday from 1 p.m. until 4 p.m. In Acton, they will be sold Thursday and Friday evening and all day Saturday at Sobeys.



Unit Manager Mary Ann Mahill said she is particularly proud of the transportation services provided by the Cancer Society. In Wellington County, volunteers clocked over 400,000 km last year, driving people to Grand River, Hamilton, Toronto, London or anywhere necessary. Mahill said, "As a cancer survivor, I know what their kindness can do. The drivers are the heart of the program. I am very proud of them and the work they do. They always get the patient to treatment on-time and in all weather."

Mahill said the Cancer Society is always looking for volunteers for all kinds of activities, from fund raising to making sandwiches for events. She added that the CCS raises the most funds outside of the government for research in the country. Another major campaign in the works for Wellington East and Acton is Relay for Life slated for this fall. Mahill said, "Cancer takes power away, but giving takes it

White Tanning Co. applies to house immigrant workers

White Tanning Company, located on the Erin-Eramosa Townline, has applied to Erin Township for a zoning amendment to allow for housing of immigrant workers. Guelph/Eramosa was consulted regarding the municipal wells' proximity to the

According to manager Tom Mance, their operations will not be increasing, just specializing. Mance said the company is hiring immigrant workers because they have a hard time finding employees locally. They are expanding overseas business by purchasing hides from Europe, as they are cheaper, and some workers will be trained to handle those overseas transactions. Their custom tanning operations for hunters also requires more employees as man hours and labour are more intensive than regular production.

The family-owned company has been in business for 50 years. Mance said many tanneries did not survive the costs of stricter environmental regulations and competition with China but his company adapted. It spent over \$1,000,000 on effluent treatment in the last ten years. He said all their dyes are non-metal and water-soluble. To meet these costs, the company specializes in custom tanning and special products, which yield a higher profit margin, such as leather for prostheses and horse hide gloves for the military.

Council considering "Dark Skies" policy


