In past years, one of the most popular items we could dredge up out of the past were old vessel passages. Our members found them to be of great interest, not only because most, if not all, of the ships mentioned had long since passed from the scene, but also because they brought back memories of times when a visit to one of the shipwatching spots around the lakes would yield an amazing number of boats to see in the course of any given day. For instance, a "good" day at the Soo in 1992 might produce fifteen ships, whereas not so many years ago, a day there was not a good one for photographers unless there were fifty or more ships.

The following passages were taken from "The Toronto Daily Star" of Saturday, May 26, 1917. Sit back, take a look at some of the names, and let yourself drift 75 years back in time. And while you are at it, see if you can spot the names of any ships that may still be with us on the lakes today.
