District President Tells of W.I. Work

The district president, Mrs. Ellerby, made the October Women's Institute meeting of Scotch Block at the home of Mrs. C. Service especially interesting as she described different aspects of her Institute work as she found them when she attended conferences and directors' meetings. Since it was the community activities and public relations meeting, Mrs. Ellerby praised the Scotch Block Institute for living up to its obligations in community activities.

Being good neighbors is part of community activities, she said. We are all neighbors, not only in the community but around the world, as was shown at the August A.C. W.W. conference in Toronto and the world plowing match at Cobourg.

The A.C.W.W. conference gave the W.I. members a feeling of belonging to something worthwhile. We should be grateful that we are living in this Canadian land of plenty. Twenty-seven countries at the A.C.W.W. conference expressed their thanks for help from Canada. We should try to live up to the Institute objective to make the world a better place in which to live, she declared. The members who attended the Guelph convention were advised to co-operate, to pool resources, to give of talents and especially to put away petty personal differences—because united we stand. The standing committee reports give hints for papers, roll calls and mottoes—so make use of them.

Women's Institutes should publicize their work to let the rest of the community know what the W.I. does. Mrs. L. F. Clarke has written an account of the Twenty Years of the Scotch Block W.I. The Scotch Block plans to hold an evening birthday celebration in Ligny school sometime during November. Mrs. Ellerby thought that the W.I. should bring more recreation into the Institute work; by having debates, farm forums, reading and social clubs, junior home-making demonstrations and night schools to teach hobbies for recreation.

If each member lived up to the responses given to the roll call, "What can I do to make my Institute a success?", the Scotch Block W.I. would be very successful. The reports from the standing committees were interesting. On agriculture and Canadian industries, Mrs. F. Joyce read an article, "Ontario's Future, Conservation or Else." For citizenship and education, Mrs. N. Lawson read a poem, "Our Country School House." Community activities and public relations convenor Mrs. C. Services gave a resume of the district directors' meeting. The Unitarian service advised the members that Canadian barley is much needed in Korea.

During the business period, the Institute members voted that \$50 be sent to the Unitarian Service for use in Korea. Mrs. Service stressed the importance of buying T.B. seals. County Council Meeting Handles Routine Business

Routine business and consideration of communications were the chief concern of Halton County council during the shortest session of the year last Tuesday afternoon. Esquing Township council requested the county to take over about a mile and a half of road which divides Chinguacousy and Esquing townships. It was explained a certain portion of the road was now a county road but the balance was in need of repair. Esquing members felt the road might have better attention if it was declared a county road. It was agreed the communication should be filed until the first of next year, when the new council could include the expenditure in the 1954 estimates.

Two communications were received from Trafalgar township council, pointing out problems on the seventh line and a lumber pile stored close to the county road at the C.N.R. crossing at Bronte. Members were informed the stop signs on the seventh line and highway 5 intersection were not in a good location and it was considered if it would be wise to erect a third of larger proportions. Reeve Emerson Ford, Trafalgar, said there were a number of near accidents and in some cases, motorists were on the highway before they realized it. The county road committee is to investigate the matter, with a departmental engineer. Some felt that some of the signs should be raised to provide better visibility.

Lumber stock-piled close to the second line at the Bronte railway crossing, obscuring eastbound trains, was the second complaint registered by Trafalgar. The reeve said as this is a county road, his council felt something might be done to have the owner, the Midway Lumber Co., move the pile back. Reeve L. MacArthur, Oakville, pointed out this area was zoned as industrial and wondered what the county could do to prevent the owner constructing a factory building up to the line fence. Members felt it was a matter for Trafalgar council to deal with, possibly having an interview with the owner and requesting him not to stock-pile the lumber so close to the road allowance. Members were also reminded the crossing in question was protected with a signal system to warn motorists of an oncoming train.

Members were reminded the drive have hospital accounts reduced has been successful, as the accounts a year ago were considerably higher. Council approved a recommendation that the treasurer render hospital accounts quarterly to the various municipalities. Reeve MacArthur felt it would give the municipalities a better opportunity to possibly collect some of these accounts. In the past the county billed the various municipalities yearly.

The question of reviewing the county assessor's salary was discussed briefly after deputy-reeve Robert Marshall reported on salaries received by assessors of other neighboring counties. Council felt it should await a further recommendation from the assessment committee, when it had an opportunity to study the question.

Council instructed the clerk to prepare an amending-by-law to establish the remuneration of members of the County Court of Revision. Warden George Leslie told members they had been appointed to receive the same remuneration as council members, but this had been overlooked last year.

Warden Leslie introduced and welcomed E. R. Pearen as deputy-reeve of Milton, to members of council. For the balance of the term, he replaces B. C. McKerr, who recently resigned from that office. Council adjourned to meet again on November 10.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Mitchell spent Sunday with friends at Campbellville and attended the church anniversary services.


