

It's **BACK-TO-SCHOOL** Time

Expect 1,019 in Public Schools Will Occupy All 36 Classrooms

The 36 classrooms in the three Milton Public Schools will open on Tuesday morning as an estimated 1,019 Milton and district students begin the annual September back-to-school trek.

Supervising principal E. W. Foster reports that 16 rooms will be in use at the J. M. Denyes school, 12 in use at the Bruce St. school and eight in use at the W. I. Dick school.

H. School Crowded Over 600 Will Enroll

Milton District High Schools on Martin St. and Williams Ave. will re-open next Tuesday morning, September 8, at 9 a.m., principal R. C. Hunter announced. First classes will be held on Wednesday, following the Tuesday half-day registration period.

Over 600 students are expected to arrive at the Williams Ave. school gymnasium for an opening assembly, then head for their home classrooms to register. Martin St. students will be bussed there right after the assembly.

There were 560 students in the two schools at the June closing, and the principal expects over 600 to attend this fall. Technical courses will be operating the same as last year.

The schools are crowded and the board is working on plans for a large addition to the Williams Ave. school. This year the ladies' staff room at Williams Ave. has been converted into a small classroom, and every available classroom will be occupied.

Close to 600 children are expected to enroll in the two north Burlington schools — Fairview (Lowville) and Kilbride — when school opens next Tuesday. D. S. Lawless, superintendent of public schools in Burlington said 375 are expected at Fairview, and 210 at Kilbride.

Kilbride opens with a new principal, James N. Morrison, who is a graduate of Hamilton Teachers College and just completed his 11th year of teaching in the Burlington school system. He was vice-principal of Elizabeth Gardens school since 1962. Miss Florence Meares, who was principal at Kilbride four years, was promoted and transferred to the post of principal at Lakeshore Public School, a 10-room school.

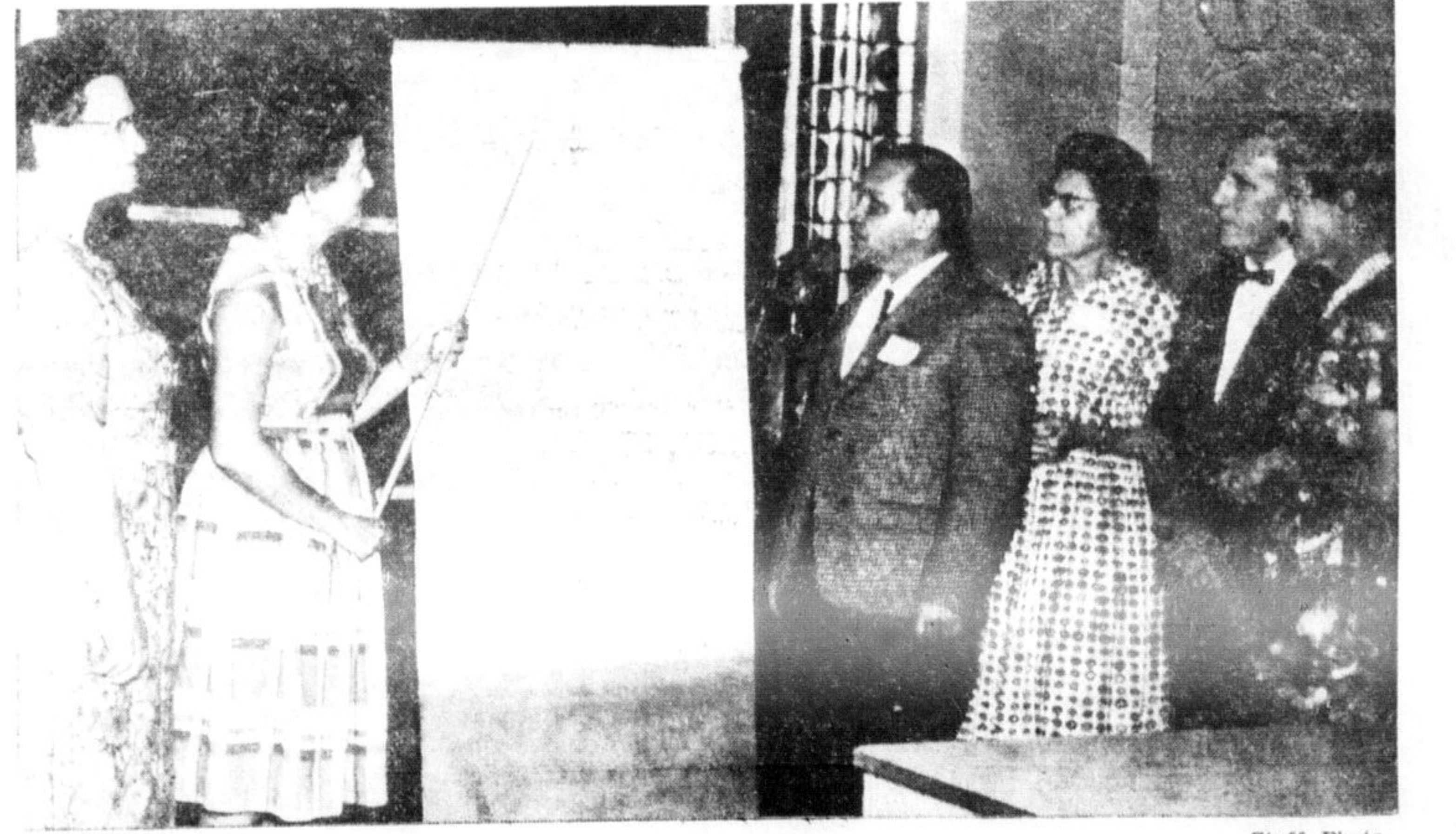

Total attendance at Burlington's public and high schools is expected to be around 14,050 next Tuesday. Additions are planned for Clarksdale, Rolling Meadows and Pineland, and construction will start soon on the new Tecumseh school. A \$1,300,000 addition to Nelson High School is underway to make it the town's second composite school.

The Board said Central and Aldershot schools will provide arts and science branch courses, while the M. M. Robinson and Nelson High schools will give arts and science, commerce and technology courses.

PART I — PUBLIC SCHOOL PUPILS

(a) Fairview
Routes and pick up times will be the same as for the 1963-64 school year. Kindergarten pupils will be advised individually by telephone as to pick up times.

(b) Kilbride
Routes will be the same as for the school year 1963-64. First pick up on Trafalgar-Burlington Town Line at 8:15 a.m. Kindergarten pupils will attend the afternoon class.

(c) John A. Lockhart
For kindergarten and pupils in grades 1 to 4 inclusive residing on the beach boulevard. First pick up at municipal house number 1257 at 8:05 a.m. Bus will travel easterly with stops at the following house numbers: 1375, 1453, 1198.

(d) Mountain Gardens
Kindergarten pupils from Leighland Road and Westland Survey area will attend the morning class. Pick up at the junction of Brant Street and Leighland Road at 8:45 a.m.

(e) Rolling Meadows
Routes will be the same as for the 1963-64 school year. First pick up at the junction of the Burlington-Trafalgar Town Line and No. 5 Highway at 8:30 a.m. Kindergarten pupils will attend the afternoon class.

(f) John T. Tuck
(1) Routes and pick up times will be the same as for the 1963-64 school year. Kindergarten pupils will attend the morning class.
(2) For kindergarten and grade 1 pupils residing in the Dynes Road area, bus will pick up children at junction of Dynes Road and Oakhurst Drive at 8:45 a.m.

(g) Woodview
(1) Routes and pick up times will be the same as for the 1963-64 school year. A map showing location of bus stop and scheduled time is available at Woodview Public School.
(2) Kindergarten pupils will attend Maplehurst Public School for the morning class and will be picked up with the grade pupils.

(h) Enrichment and Opportunity Class Pupils
(1) Children attending the Opportunity Class at Fairview School will be transported on the regular bus routes.
(2) Children attending the Opportunity Classes at Rolling Meadows School and who require transportation will be transported on the regular bus routes.
(3) A map showing location of bus stop and scheduled time has been distributed to all other children who attend these classes and who require transportation.

PART II — SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS

(a) Nelson High School
(1) Students who reside north of the Queen Elizabeth Highway. Routes and pick up times will be the same as for the 1963-64 school year.
(2) Students who reside in Mountain Gardens, Clarksdale, and Rolling Meadows area. Routes and pick up times will be the same as for the 1963-64 school year. A map showing the location of bus stop and scheduled time is available at Nelson High School.

(b) M. M. Robinson High School
(1) Students who reside north of the Queen Elizabeth Highway. Routes and times will be the same as for the 1963-64 school year.
(2) Students who reside south of C.N.R. and in Aldershot area. A map showing location of bus stop and scheduled time is available at M. M. Robinson High School, Aldershot High School, Burlington Central High School, and Nelson High School.

(c) Waterdown High School
A map showing the location of bus stop and scheduled time is available at Waterdown High School.

YOUTH ALLOWANCES

IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR PARENTS

At the end of September the first payments will be made under the Youth Allowances Act recently passed by Parliament. If you have a child who is 16 or 17 years of age, is maintained by you, and is either in full-time attendance at school or university, or is unable to attend by reason of physical or mental infirmity, you may be eligible for a monthly allowance of \$10.

THIS ALLOWANCE MUST BE APPLIED FOR — IT WILL NOT BE SENT AUTOMATICALLY

During August application forms were sent to the parents of children already 16 or 17, or who would be 16 before September. If you have a child who meets the above requirements, and for any reason an application has not reached you, you can obtain one by writing to the Regional Director of Family Allowances in your provincial capital.

The applications should be returned as soon as possible, in order to ensure prompt receipt of the first payment.
