Seek Legal Opinion On Garage Drainage

A Committee of Adjustment decision, noting a problem of drainage but permitting construction of a garage, caused Milton Council concern Monday as they wondered about the municipality's involvement. A legal opinion was to be sought prior to the next meeting.

The decision of the committee granted Eric H. Worsley, 278 Martin St., permission to build an attached garage to within two feet, two and a half inches from the south property line. "Evidence disclosed some opposition to drainage of the rear yards of neighbors. This committee is of the opinion this is a civil matter and this committee has no jurisdiction over the drainage of private property."

Go to Solicitor
Members of council wondered if the town, in granting permission for the garage through its Committee of Adjustment, would incur any responsibility and agreed to have the town solicitor submit a report.

There was no discussion on a second committee decision granting Camart Investments extension of the R3 zone on Court St. to extend into the remaining portion of the MC zone, "as the small MC frontage could not be used for any use economically."

Milton Council Briefs

During the regular meeting of Milton Council Monday, members:

- Agreed to the preparation of a by-law restricting parking on Williams Ave. between Maplewood Cres. and the entrance to Milton District High School, at the suggestion of the police committee.
- Assured K. Jensen and A. Falk that curbing planned for Mill St. would not block the entrance to Milton Laundromat and Milton Tire Service properties.
- Agreed to host the next meeting of the Halton County Clerks' and Treasurers' Association.
- Was advised Mrs. T. Plunkett, wife of the man who is to prepare the Needs Study on Halton and Peel, had died and Mr. Plunkett may be unable to attend a meeting of the clerks and treasurers.
- Delegated the clerk to attend a meeting in Oakville on the Canadian Vocational Training program.
- Approved the proclamation of Fire Prevention Week, October 3 to 9.
- Received and filed copy of the notice that the Township of Nassagaweya plans to pass a zoning by-law.
- Agreed to the installation of a sewer connection to property adjacent to the Canadian Tire Store to serve Bob Hassard Motors. Cost of the installation is to be borne by the property owner and the works superintendent is to determine the most feasible route for the connection.
- Approved installation of a brighter light at the corner of Mary and Charles St. to increase visibility.
- Directed a letter from the mayor to all those who participated in the town's annexation application, expressing the town's appreciation for their interest. The letter was to go to those in support and opposition.
- Approved purchase of an adding machine at an approximate cost of \$300.
- Learned 170 cedar trees had been planted at the land fill site.

Board Reserves Decision In Milton Annexation Bid

In what proved to be the final day of Milton's application for the annexation of 2,785 acres from Esquesing and Oakville, Ontario Municipal Board members last Wednesday:

- Heard evidence from four town witnesses to conclude the town case; five Oakville witnesses and two Esquesing witnesses.
- Listed to final argument by the three solicitors.
- Heard agreement Milton would arrange Esquesing costs between the Milton and Esquesing solicitors, and Oakville and Milton would pay their own costs.
- Heard two industrial property owners ask to be annexed to the town from Esquesing.

William Johnson representing Johnson Bros Trucking expressed his desire to have two parcels of land including 99 acres in Esquesing and 50 in Oakville annexed. He cited garbage collection, police

protection, cheaper water and the shortage of homes for his employees as reasons for endorsing annexation.

Trucking Water
J. L. Goldie, plant manager of Star Steel Ltd., owners of 21 acres south of 401 in Esquesing endorsed annexation on the basis of services and cheaper hydro rates. He noted the firm's well went dry two weeks ago and they had been trucking water since. Questioned on the town assurances of water if necessary, Mr. Goldie indicated these discussions had not been with him.

Proceeding with Milton evidence, Solicitor D. A. McConachie called Bruce McKerr, works superintendent. Mr. McKerr indicated the town had sufficient equipment for road maintenance but was contemplating a division of snow plowing equipment whether annexation was completed or not. He also reviewed the spring road spraying program as part of the maintenance work that costs about \$1,000 a mile.

Planned construction of a steel

works building for the storage of municipal equipment was explained. On the subject of garbage collection, Mr. McKerr estimated existing equipment would be satisfactory. Collections are already made at the Ontario School for the Deaf and Milton District Hospital.

Turning to the water supply systems, Mr. McKerr pointed out approvals had been received and materials ordered for installation of 500 feet of water line on Ontario St. linking existing lines and 3,400 feet on Ontario St from Mountainview to Oak St. Work is planned for this fall.

Under cross examination by Oakville solicitor John Depew, Mr. McKerr indicated he had made no calculation on the road mileage that would be added if annexation was granted.

Dispute Cost
Cross examining for Esquesing, John T. Weir wondered if the proposed six inch water main connecting link on the Base Line would be adequate to serve Star Steel. Mr. McKerr indicated it would require about a mile and a half of line to serve Star Steel, located just south of Highway 401. Estimates of cost given at \$4 a foot were disputed.

A. E. Milson, secretary-treasurer of the Milton District High School testified on the attendance and accommodation in the school. He noted all the high (Continued on Page Eight)

The tender of Godson Contractors, lowest of four bids received, includes \$8,125.40 for the installation of a 15 inch relief sewer between Bell St. and Maplewood

\$50,000 Nassagaweya Building Opens for First Time on Monday

The sparkling new Nassagaweya Township administration building on the Guelph Line, opposite Brookville Hall, will be opened for the first time on Monday. The move from the

cramped quarters in the township hall to the new building will take approximately two days and will start on Friday, Reeve William Coulter reports. The complete cost of the new

building, with furniture and landscaping included, will approach \$50,000. On Monday evening, the township council will hold its first meeting in the new building, which features a large council chamber, offices for the clerk, road superintendent, assessor and receive plus a large working area — approximately the size of three offices.

The basement in the grey brick building can be easily converted into office area in the future. The building was designed by architect Clare Maclean, formerly of Campbellville.

Reeve Coulter suggests the official opening of the new building will probably take place in late October or early November.

Robertson, Steelworkers Negotiating on Contract

Negotiations for a new contract between Local 4970, United Steelworkers of America and P. L. Robertson Manufacturing Co. Ltd., Milton, commenced re-

cently and Union president Max Bradbury reports discussions to date have been "of a most satisfactory nature".

The present contract expired on Monday, Sept. 27. To date two meetings have been held between union and company negotiators and another is scheduled for later this week. "Relationship and progress between both committees have been of a most satisfactory nature", Mr. Bradbury said in a press release issued Monday. "It is desired by our committee that a fair agreement will be reached without the necessity of outside assistance" (conciliation board).

Judge Sprague Visits Council

His Honor Judge Alan B. Sprague, Halton's new county court judge, paid an official visit to Halton County Council at last week's September meeting of the council. He spoke at length at the beginning of the council meeting, then joined councillors at an informal gathering after the meeting to meet each one personally.

Judge Sprague said county councils are "an old and honorable tradition, holding a high and special place in the history of our democracy in Canada." He told the members "you are part of the oldest form of democratic government in the English-speaking world... you are the real grass roots of democracy."

He outlined the duties of a county judge, impressing on members his work must proceed courteously, wisely, soberly and impartially. "You are the rulers of today, and the judges are to see to it that your laws, as rulers, are obeyed. You and I in our separate ways are the servants of the people of Canada, and Canada will only be as great or as small as its servants," he concluded.

Opened Earlier
Tenders for the projects had been opened by the finance committee at a meeting the previous Friday to enable the engineer to present a recommendation for the Monday meeting.

It was pointed out the sewer installation had been initially estimated at \$4,200 and the lowest tender was \$8,125. Councillor B. Best explained new safety regulations introduced since the initial estimate required the use of steel shoring rather than wood on the job. It was suggested this would account for part of the increase.

Deputy Reeve A. Ledwith, dealing with the Williams Ave. project, noted it was \$6,500 over the estimate. "How long will this go on?" he wondered, suggesting the engineering estimates should be closer.

The clerk-manager explained he had also asked the engineers to include their fees in all projects on which they estimate in future.

Start Fall Teen Activities New Saturday Morning Club

The first fall meeting of the Milton Teen Club and the organization for the "Saturday Morning Club" have been planned for the weekend by recreation director Bob Small.

The Teen Club, which has a membership of 80, will kick-off its fall season with a meeting in the Town Hall at 7 p.m. on Friday evening. Mr. Small and club president Sharon Lyons plan to outline the fall program and after the meeting, there will be dancing to records and refreshments.

"The Saturday Morning Club" will be open to elementary school aged children and arts and crafts will be taught. Another possible off-shoot of the Saturday Morning Club can be the start of a "Slot Car Club" if enough interest is shown. So far about 10 people have shown an interest in starting a club. The first meeting of the new club will be at 10 a.m. in the Town Hall on Saturday.

Mr. Small also plans to organize a leadership course and one of the major parts of the course will be the showing of films which explain the qualities necessary and the jobs expected of leaders in the community. The leadership class would be held on Monday evenings and there are opening for 10 people.

Mr. Small served as Milton's summer recreation director for four months and will continue to organize a Recreation Committee sponsored program on a part-time basis until at least Christmas. He is a second year recreation course student at the University of Guelph.

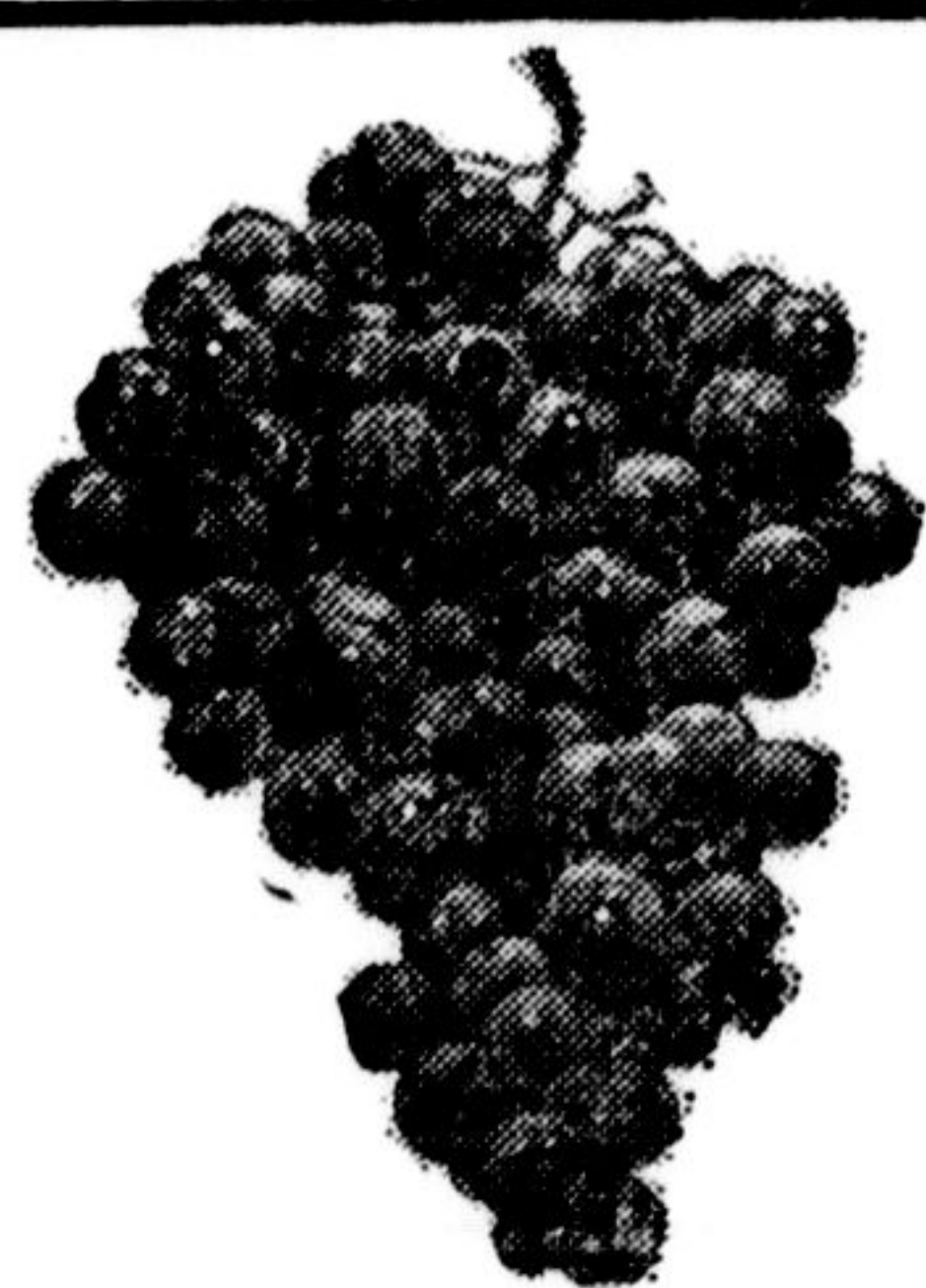
