Dude Lindsay, Cliff Houston named to hall of fame

Dude Lindsay of Acton and Cliff Houston of Milton were among five new members named to the Halton County Sports Hall of Fame at the second annual Sports Appreciation Night held in the Oakville Arena Saturday night.

Other new members of the Hall of Fame include, Magistrate James R. Black of Oakville, Scotty Patterson of Georgetown

and Jack Rogers of Burlington. Several awards of merit were also presented to Oakville and area people for their contributions to Sports during the 1968-69 season.

Dude Lindsay was named to the Hall of Fame not only for his great prowess as a hockey and baseball player but also for his continuing neip in coaching and organizing teams in recent

years. Dude was a star of Acton's O.B.A. Championship Intermediate team of 1947, played on several O.H.A. Intermediate hockey finalists. When his playing days were over, Dude remained active in sports, coaching Acton Merchants of the Halton County Baseball League as well as minor hockey and softball teams.

Cliff Houston played both hockey and baseball for Milton Intermediate teams and later managed Milton Red Sox of the Halton County Baseball League. Cliff has maintained his interest in sports in recent years, working as a hockey referee, baseball umpire and helping to organize tennis programs in Milton.

Magistrate Black has taken an active part in many Halton County sports programs over the years and is a lifetime member of the Halton County Baseball Association. Scotty Patterson was one of the greatest all-round athletes that Georgetown ever produced, while Jack Rogers is well known in the southern part of the county for his work with the old Oakville Black Knights football team and last year's O.H.A. Junior "C" finalist Oakville Blades.

Included in the special awards of merit were presentations to Al Hall of the famed Al Halls Trafalgar Chicks of the Halton County Rural Softball League, Jean Inglehart for her part in the Palermo Athletic organization and Dave Inglehart as most valuable player for 1969 on Palermo's entry in the Halton County Rural loop.

Oakville's assistant recreation director, Murray Walker acted as announcer for the evening and Reeve Al Day presented the Hall of Fame awards.

Close to 1,000 people danced to the music of two different bands in between presentations during the evening.

On a return game to Penetang, on Sunday Milton broke Penetang's confidence in the first inning with five runs and from there on there was no stopping them.

Greg Emms was the winning pitcher with Gary Dance taking over for the sixth and seventh innings.
