Drumquin Park will remain public property, Oakville Parks and Recreation Committee decided at a meeting last week. The meeting overruled a recommendation from the finance committee that wished to sell the 115 acre property and use the funds for park acquisition in south Oakville.

Oakville expects to lose the park to Central Halton in regional government. An Oakville councillor Don Gordon had a motion passed that would establish a policy for the commission that would forbid the sale, lease or rental of any public park land in the town in the future.
