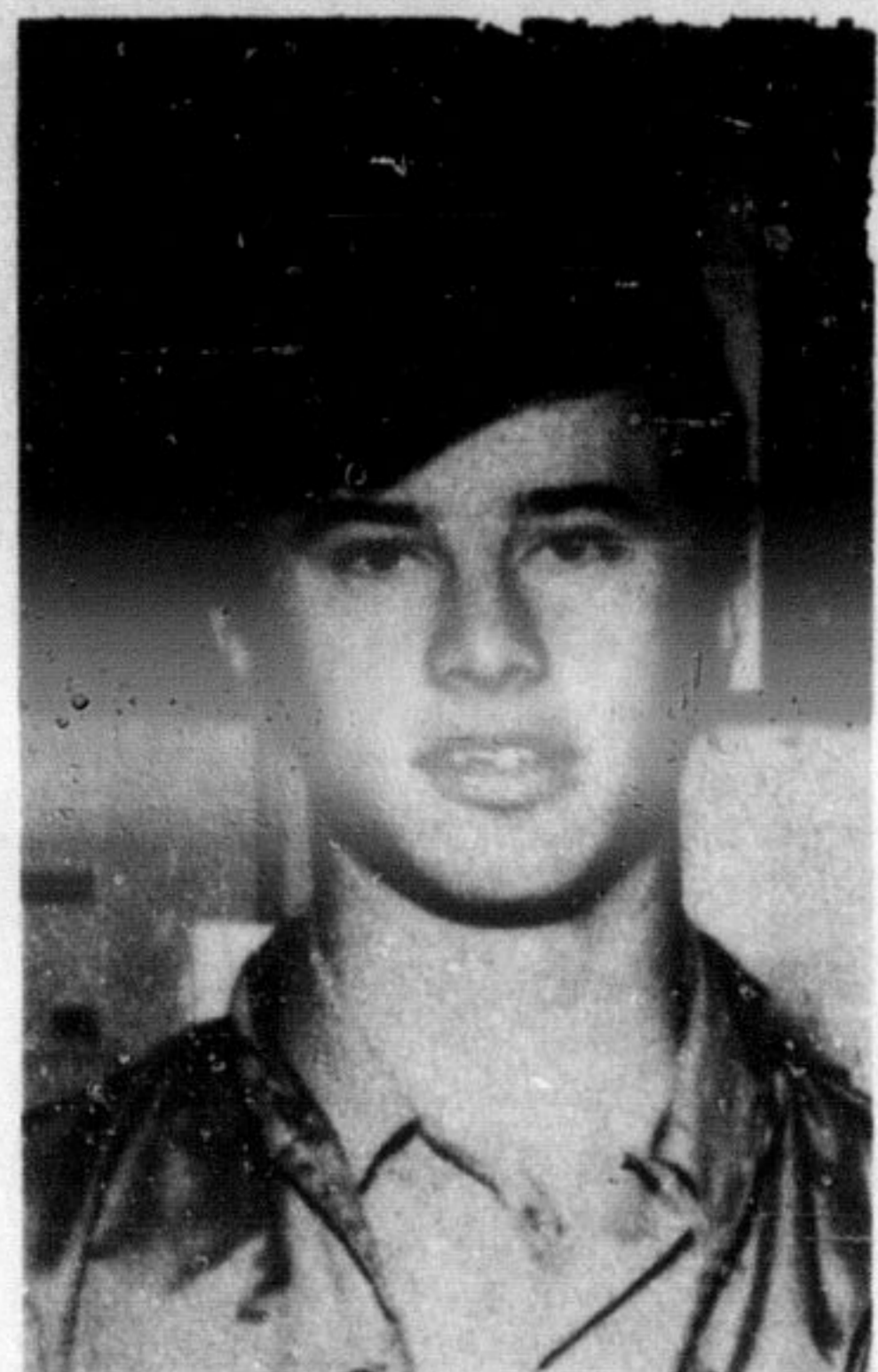


Defending champs lose game

Four Milton players picked in midget draft

Four Milton hockey players were picked by Junior "A" teams in the annual midget draft held in Toronto Thursday. Centre John Tonelli was the Toronto Marlboros' second round choice following the pick of two defencemen in the first round.

Rick Bridgman, the sturdy centre man for Milton Midgets, was chosen by Peterborough Petes although he had been asked by Oshawa to join their camp. Right winger Ken Fay was the 18th round London Knights choice and he had been talking with the Southern Ontario Junior League, Chatham team. Finally, Scott McKenzie, the 14th round

Hamilton Red Wings pick, says he has also been contacted by Chatham.

Likes Marlies

Although 16 year-old John Tonelli has played for Milton Junior B team, he still has another year of midget hockey left. But John says, "I'll play for Toronto if they give me a scholarship. I'd like to play for the Marlies, they're a good team to get drafted by. They're always one of the top teams." John was named rookie of the year and leading scorer for the Continental Flyers last year. He scored 20 goals and assisted on 25 others for

a 45 point total in only 40 games. John is five foot eleven inches and weighs 160 pounds and will enter grade 11 next fall.

When asked if he thought he'd make the Peterborough team, Rick Bridgman replied, "I don't know, it's going to be tough. I'll have to keep in shape through the summer." Rick played all his minor hockey in Milton from novice to midget. Rick is five foot four inches, weighing 145 pounds and will graduate from grade ten this year.

Seventeen year-old Ken Fay shared the most valuable player trophy in the Juvenile Tournament held at Easter. He says

he'll try out with the London team. "I don't know what the camp is like but I imagine it's very tough. I'm hoping to keep in shape all summer." Ken is a grade eleven student at Milton District High School and he will continue his education in London if he plays there. He attributes former coach Carl Hymers "for helping me play better positional hockey." Ken also played all his minor hockey in Milton.

May try Chatham

The other fellow to share the most valuable player trophy with Ken was linemate Scott McKenzie. Scott was picked by Hamilton but he is considering playing for Chatham, the team which contacted him earlier. He says, "I haven't decided yet. It's a good thing going up to the big league but it's going to be hard making the team." He also pointed out that if he played for the London Knights, he would be ineligible for an American scholarship. However, if he played in the other league for Chatham, "after I finish high school, I could be looking for a scholarship in an American College." Scott is 16 and will be entering grade 12 this fall.

Considering the size of Milton and the fact that Oakville had one player chosen and Sarnia only had two, four players being chosen from Milton says a lot for the calibre of hockey and possibly the calibre of coaching in the Milton Minor Hockey Association.
