When John Tonelli made Bantam years. his jump from minor to junior Enio Sclisizzi worked with thought for a 15-year-old he was moving too fast. By the time the season got underway Tonelli had alleviated those fears and showed that he belonged.

There must have been some doubting Toms around when news broke last spring about Tonelli being drafted by the Toronto Marlboros. Those fears too have been dispensed with and once again Tonelli has proven he's going to stick. Tonelli has the distinction of being the first 15-year-old ever drafted by the Toronto Marlboros and the first Milton boy to play with that club since Murray "Cowboy"


Smith, who still plays with the Senior "A" Galt Hornets participated in the recent CCM International tournament against teams from Sweden, Czechoslovakia and




