Women hit hardest by AIB

Working women have been hardest hit by the Wage and with one exception-females Price Controls legislation, said Grace Hartman, nation- promotion. al president of Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE).

Speaking on Women in the Work Force at Sheridan College Oakville Campus Thursday, Ms. Hartman said that according to Prime Minister Trudeau, the guidelines set by the Anti-Inflation Board are designed to assist the

little people. She compared the eight per cent wage guideline to someone earning \$10,000 who would receive an annual increase of \$800 to a person making \$30,000 who would

receive \$2,400 per year. "It would be more reasonable to reverse this situation. The AIB program is most harmful to women since they hold the vast majority of low paying jobs. This is a curious way to help the little people,' Ms. Hartman said.

She added that this is one of the reasons why more and more women are joining unions. Out of a total CUPE membership of 230,000, almost half are women, many whom are activists, fighting to remove thoughtless legislation concerning equal pay, maternity leave and day care.

"Change doens't occur by wishing or dreaming. It's an ongoing process, dealing with injustices. Change is only achieved through the collective bargaining and CUPE is assisting through organization using technical skills to achieve these goals," she

Ms. Hartman cited one example of effective collective bargaining in the reclassification of Dietary Aid, a position only available to females and Cook's Helper, only open to men.
