Niss Canada to join Santa

public appearances this weekend in Milton. She will be appearing in Milton's Santa Claus parade, scheduled for Saturday at 2.30 p.m., riding in a convertible sponsored by The Champion.

The French-Canadian beauty, who won the coveted title last Monday evening in competition with 33 other regional beauty queens from across Canada, will headline a parade featuring nine bands, 20 floats and several miscellaneous entries.

Spectators can watch the annual holiday season kick off along its route which begins at the fair grounds, moving along Hugh St. to Mary, then from Brown to Main. The procession will break up at E.C. Drury School.

The Niagara Frontiersmen, a marching band, is coming to Milton Saturday from Depew, New York along with many area bands including Burlington Teen Tour Band, York Lions Steel Band, Brampton Clown Band, Milton District Pipe Band and Acton Citizens Band.

Silver batons will twirl with such groups as Brampton Optimist, Georgetown Shooting Stars and Burlington and Central Lions Majorettes taking part in the procession.

The Parade's main attraction, Santa Claus, will be riding in a new float this year which has been constructed by Maplehurst inmates for the parade committee.

A host of entires will lead up to the well known sleigh with its team of eight tiny reindeer. Included in the entries are Milton Players, Rock-

Krantz gets right to work

The 15-year political career of Don Gordon came to an end at 11.19 p.m. Monday.

With the running tally showing Mr. Gordon with 2,940 votes to Gord Krantz's 3,372 votes, it was time for the two-term Milton mayor to concede defeat to another 15-year political

"I'm asking you all to support this man," Mr. Gordon said and he urged the audience of an estimated 300 people to remain united, even if it would be under a new administration.

The final unofficial tally showed Mr. Krantz with 4,024 votes to Mr. Gordon's 3,554. Mr. Krantz took 21.67 per cent of the vote to Mr. Gordon's 19.13 per cent. Milton had 18,569 eligible to vote.

In the advance poll, Mr. Gordon was ahead 26 to 11 but it was to be one of the only two times during the night Mr. Gordon would be ahead. When the Hornby area poll came in, Don Gordon led briefly by 154 votes to 101, but for the rest of the night, Mr. Krantz pulled out a 450-vote margin which proved the buffer until the end of the evening.

With an unwavering smile, Mr. Gordon asked his wife Pauline to come to the stand at the west side of Lions Club Hall and he applauded her for her continuous support as Milton's first lady for the past four years.

Now that he is no longer in politics, Mr. Gordon says his leave of absence at Ford of Canada Ltd. will be over and he will be returning to the firm, probably in the cost analysis department.

Milton's new mayor Gord Krantz, 43, called Mr. Gordon "a gentleman" and said he admired the defeated mayor because "he played the game the way it is supposed to be

"I've served with Don for seven years on Milton Council and I've always found him to be the gentleman," he said.

But the words of praise were soon ended and Mr. Krantz said he must call the new council together as soon as possible in order to brief everyone on what will be expected in the next two years.

"I'll be getting hold of Roy Main, the clerk,

tomorrow, and will be setting up a meeting before the inaugural, which I believe is Dec. 10," he said.

Mr. Krantz said the first order of business on the new administration "will be to get together and resolve the OP 7 question."

He was referring to the planning amendment which will, if ever resolved, create an 1,100 acre industrial park along the north side of Highway 401.

Another top priority will be the 1981 Town of Milton budget.

"The increases are going to have to be kept in line, particularly with respect to what is happening down at the Region.

"I'm not as informed on the deficit situation there at this point, but I will be making it a point to become knowledgeable about the sewer surcharge and the fiscal deficit as soon as possible.

"It won't take me long to find out what is going on there," he said.

Asked if the vote in his favor by Milton's electorate was a repudiation of the current municipal administration, the situation at

Halton Region, or a wind-of-change philosophy which seemed to be evident in Ontario Monday evening, Mr. Krantz said it was "probably a combination of all those fac-

He said he felt the issue of leadership, which had been the focal point of his election platform, had been significant in the victory. "Leadership is still the key.

"I don't think the people liked the way things were going at town hall, and they voted accordingly," he said.

He said he did not want to acquire the reputation of a "tough mayor" but he said he intends to stick by his statements of being the "axeman" when it comes time to spending municipal funds.

"The other thing I have to do first is gain the respect of the council, if I'm going to get anything done.

"I will be giving more details on that within the next few days, but I must become more knowledgable on where we stand on a number of issues," he said.

Milton voters turned to the town's long-established families and incumbents Monday to direct the future of the 26,000 residents living here over the next two years.

Gord Krantz, a lifelong Milton resident ousted twoterm mayor Don Grodon. Colin Best, whose father Brian earlier served as the Mayor of Milton, got the highest number of votes in Ward Two, (3,797) and will join incumbents Rose Harrison and Blanche Hinton, plus first-time challenger Don Knight on council.

In the Ward Two regional election Brad Clements, whose family goes back to the early days of the town, beat incumbent Gus Goutouski. In the Milton Hydro-Electric Commission race all the incumbents, all of whom had long service, were brought back for another term.

In the Ward Three municipal race, Don McMillan and Jim Watson, both with families going back

decades in Nassagaweya were elected to municipal office. In addition, Bill Johnson (Ward One and Three Regional) and Ward One municipal incumbents Brian Penman and Rick Day were all acclaimed.

In the mayoral campaign, Gord Krantz took 4,024 votes or 21.67 per cent of the eligible votes while Gordon took 3,554 votes or 19.14 per cent.

Also on a Milton-wide basis, 32.73 per cent of the eligible voters endorsed a regional referendum question on returning more Halton Regional services to the control of the Town of Milton. Only 4.72 per cent repudiated making changes in regionalism. The vote was 6,077 to 876 in favor of the change.

No-one seemed surprised at the out-

come. Voters put their faith in the experienced councillors who accepted their victories in stride.

In the same voting trend, Board of Education incumbent Ivan Armstrong representing Ward One and Three recorded a decisive win over his inexperienced opponent Dorothy

This was the only race for board seats as four other trustees retained their séats through acclamation.

Bill Lawson will once again represent Ward Two on Halton Board of Education as will John Bradley as the Separate Board representative on Halton Board. Angelo Tonelli and Neville Johnston are the acclaimed Separate School Board members for 1981-82.

Recount is called

Ward Two candidate Tom Blanchard has requested a recount on Monday's council ballots.

The 35-year-old first-time runner was one of nine people vying for four seats in the race and he finished fifth, just 49 votes behind incumbent Blanche Hinton. She polled 1,978, he had 1,929.
