# Eight home runs pace wide open Leaside win

Campbellville seniors dropped an exciting 10 inning slugfest by a 9-8 score when Leaside Leafs visited the Campbellville diamond Sunday afternoon.

The game featured eight home runs plus a grand slammer disallowed because the hitter—Leaside's Barry

Smith—stepped on home plate when he hit the ball. The ensuing ruckus resulted in the ejection of Smith and another Leaside player.

Leaside took a 1-0 lead in the second inning on a Chad- orowitz homer but another round tripper by Campbell- ville's Wade Bekar in the

bottom of the inning evened the score.

In the third inning a walk, a single and another walk loaded the bases for Leaside just prior to the disputed homer. Smith was called out for stepping on the plate but Leaside managed a run with an outfield sacrifice fly. Campbellville tied the game in the bottom of the third with a left field homer by Garnet Mitchell.

Bekar's fourth inning homer gave Campbellville a 3-2 lead but Leaside scored twice in the sixth with homers by Wheedon and Chadorowitz to take a 4-3 lead.

Leaside scored again in the seventh and added another run in the eighth to make it 6-3.

Five runs Campbellville came to life in the eighth with five un- earned runs. With a man on first and two out Hearn's struck out but the Leaside catcher missed the ball and tossed it into right field to leave the villagers with men at second and third.

Three consecutive walks forced two men in, then Rick Mitchell's single drove two more home. Bill Dennis'

single drove in the fifth Campbellville run.

Campbellville led in the eighth 8-6.

Leaside tied the game in the top of the ninth with a home run by Rivero and a tenth inning home run by Booth won the game for Leaside.

## Tonelli contract voided by WHA

Milton's John Tonelli may face two more years in the OHA major Junior "A" league after World Hockey Association owners voted to void his contract with the Houston Aeros at the WHA meeting in La Costa, California last week.

Tonelli was reported to have signed a three year pact with the Aeros after he turned 18 in March, while still playing with the Junior "A" Toronto Marlboros. Marlies refused to release Tonelli claiming he had signed a contract to play with them throughout his junior career.

The Marlie contract, claims Tonelli's agent Gus Badali, was signed under duress while Tonelli was only 17.

Badali is presently threatening to sue both the Aeros and the WHA.

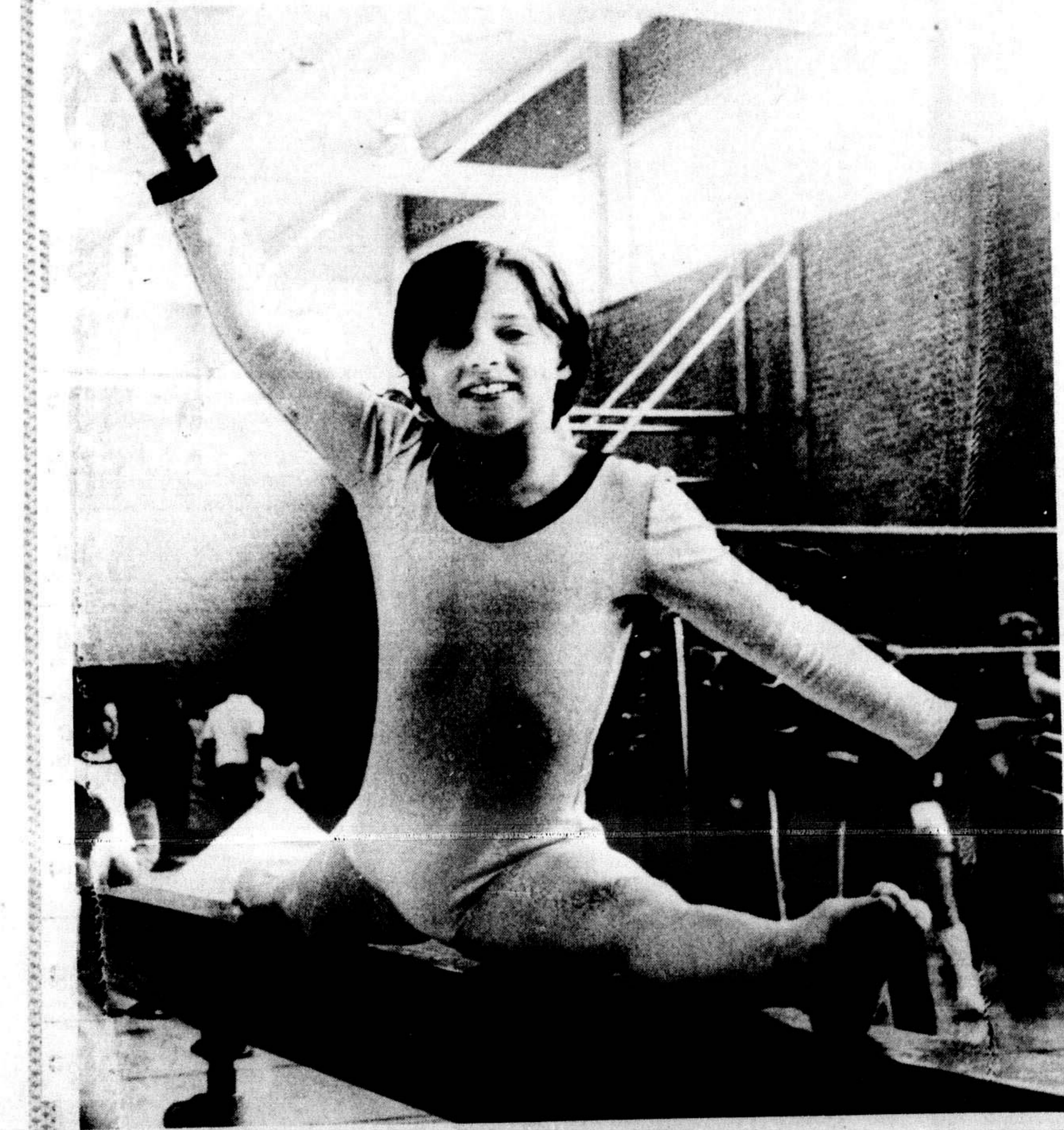
Interested coaches must be over 15 years of age. Gym coaches are invited to apply to the Milton Parks and Recreation Department.
