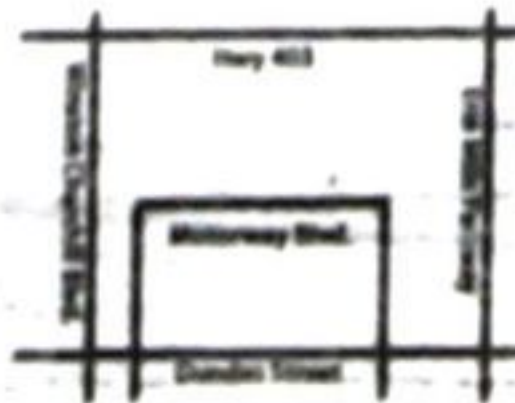


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Milton still among fastest-growing communities in Canada

Census data released on Feb. 8 reveals that Milton continues to be one of Canada's fastest-growing communities.

The numbers from Statistics Canada that focus on population and dwellings show Milton was home to 110,128 residents as of census day (May 10, 2016) — up 30.5 per cent since 2011. This makes Milton the fastest-growing community in Ontario, and sixth overall in Canada. While the town was ranked first in the country for rapid growth in the last census, the top spot has now been taken over by Warman, Sask., which has grown by 55.1 per cent since 2011 and is followed by four other Prairie municipalities where building is booming.

Mayor Gord Krantz touched on the impending census numbers during last Monday evening's council meeting and predicted that Milton may lose its "crown" as the fastest-growing municipality in the country.

In a press release the town issued following the release of the Census numbers, Krantz remained optimistic about the direction that Milton is heading.

"I'm very proud of the focus we've maintained

on ensuring that we're building a complete community as we grow," he said. "Our young, vibrant and diverse population — along with a low property tax rate, outstanding facilities and natural parks — continues to make Milton an attractive location for homebuyers and business investment."

The press release notes that with an average age of 34 and 73 per cent of residents with a post-secondary education, Milton is one of the youngest, most diverse and well-educated populations in Ontario.

On the building front, the Town of Milton processed applications to build 1,531 dwelling units (apartments, townhomes, single family homes, etc.) last year, and forecasts an additional 2,518 dwelling units in 2017 to meet the demands of new homeowners.

The town is expected to continue to grow over the next 15 years, and estimates a population of 145,000 in 2021 and 235,000 in 2031. Across Halton, the census shows the population of the region had grown to 548,435 by census day last year, representing an increase of 9.3 per cent.

Nationally, the growth rate sat at an average of five per cent, being slightly lower in Ontario at 4.6 per cent.

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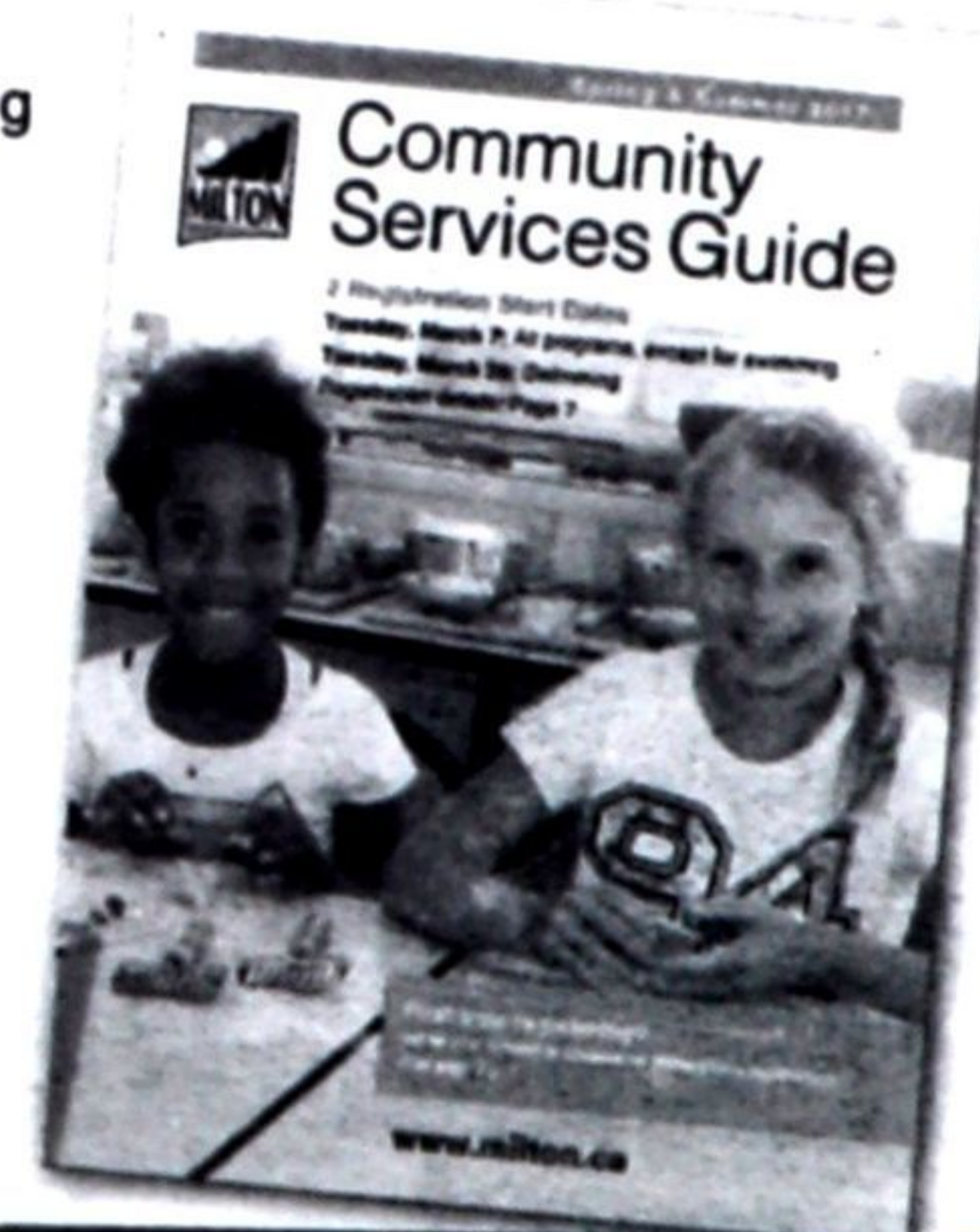
