There is nearly 1400 prisoners in the prison and out of that large number there was only 16 females to 1370 males. A majority are young and middle aged, a very few old men or women. We learned some very important facts which we noted. One was from careful investigation by the Chaplain and officers they learn that 1 of the prisoners trace the direct cause of their situation to intemperance, and all of another third indirectly to intemperance, and the remaining third in a great measure to idleness, not being learned to work while under the care of parents. The last named class say that they have been taught one good lesson; they are learning a trade and when they get out they can work and support themselves and will not have to beg, rob or steal.
