TRIP TO BOSTON.

with. There were some old, old door knockers and frying pans—one had three or four legs, about four inches high; some old andirons, shovels, tongs and bellows; old flintlocks and fowling pieces. The flintlocks are awfully heavy and clumsy but the fowling pieces are lighter. There was the cutest model of the old ship, Constitution. It was about four feet long, and the rest in proportion—the masts and spars and the life boats and steering wheel, all so cute. There were lots of old, old Indian things—old tobacco pouches and match bags, all made of Indian beadwork. I saw Sitting Bull's game bag and his sister's and daughter's hatch and work bags, all covered with beadwork. There were two spoons made by the Inroquois and some made by the Navajo Indians; they were all engraved all over. I saw some of the Washington spoons and they had G. W. and M. engraved on them. I saw Sitting Bull's pipe; the bowl part is just a straight hollow cylinder, and another one just like it stuck out of the center of it; this was on the end of a heavy hollow stick about three or four feet long. There was an old fashioned spinet there, a sort of little, low piano. O, it looked old! Most of the keys were down and cracked and broken. It didn't seem as if you could get a 'squawk' out of it at all.

From the museum we went to Boston Common. We could see the state house from there but we went out on Tremont street so we could see it better. The gilded dome is lovely; it is so bright. The building is built of a kind of yellowish brown brick and the pillars steps and trimmings are white. It is beautiful. Right near here is a lovely piece of work, of bronze, I guess. It is of some campaign in the Civil war and the soldiers are marching. There are at least four couples of soldiers and a commander in between two couples. I mean they are marching two abreast, and there are two negroes, then two white soldiers, then the commander on horseback, and then four negroes, two abreast; they have got their guns and knapsacks and waterbags, and their positions and everything look just as real as if you were looking at real live soldiers. The creases in the soldiers' shoes, the veins in the horse and its mane blowing in the wind, all looked so real. It is statuary, you know, and life size.

The fire works in the evening were grand. There were quite a few stationary pieces, pinwheels, sky rockets, flower pots and roman candles. The stationary pieces were some statues, an eagle with stars and stripes and the mayor of Boston. When they are lighted they look as if they were all outlined with electric lights and the features and every thing show up as distinctly, and then they kind of burn up. But the best of all was a naval battle. When it was lighted it showed the two boats and they shot roman candles and sky rockets at each other, which burst with reports like cannon, and stars flew out all over. I don't know how they made them all go off, there was no one on the boats.

The boats on the ocean were all lighted up with electric lights and were very pretty. When we got home I was awfully tired but I had a lovely time. (Continued next week.)
