CHANGES IN PARCEL POST

WEIGHT LIMIT IS INCREASED PRON 11 TO

On and after tomorrow, Aug. 15, 1913, the limit of weight of parcels of fourth class mail for delivery within the first and second zones shall be increased from eleven pounds to twenty the number of cattle, horses and swine pounds. The rate of postage on parcels exceeding four ounces in weight shall be five cents for the first pound and one cent for each additional two pounds or fraction thereof when intended for local delivery, and five cents for the first pound and one cent for each I additional pound or fraction thereof when intended for delivery at other offices within the first and second

The pound rates of postage in the first and second zones shall be as fol-

The rate for local delivery shall apply to all parcels mailed at a postoffice from which a rural route starts. for delivery on such route, or mailed at any point on such route for delivery at any other point thereon, or at the office from which the route starts, or on any rural route starting therefrom, and on all matter mailed at a city carrier office, or any point within its delivery limits, for delivery by carrier from that office, or at any office for local delivery.

Fresh meats and other articles mer tioned in paragraph 2, section 34, Par-cel Post Regulations, when inclosed and wrapped in the manner prescribed county fair will be exceptionally fine by the last sentence of that paragraph will be accepted for mailing to offices
