friends Sunday.

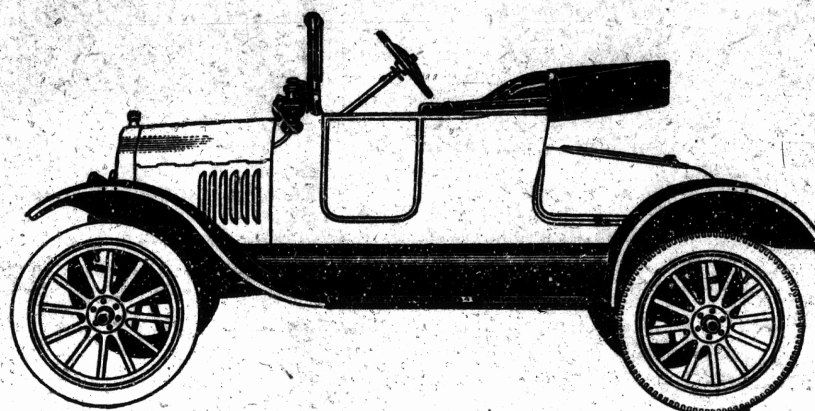
