Except where conventions for a like purpose shall be otherwise called, the delegates from the several counties comprising the several Grand Divisions of Supreme Court and the several Appella e Court Districts will meet in separate conventions immediately after the adjourn ment of the State Convention and nominate one candidate for Clerk of the Supreme Court in each of said Grand Divisions and one candidate for Clerk of the Appellate Court in each of said Appellate Court Districts.

The said State Convention will be composed of delegates from the several counties of the State of Illinois to be chosen by Republican county conventions held for that purpose. The number of delegates and the manner of their selection shall be hereinafter provided.

The result will be of inestimable benefit to the country.
