# BIG FIRE AT BILANDON.

Brandon, Jan. 17-Two bodies have been recovered and two others lie buried in the Ice-covered ruins of the Syndicate Block, that' was one of Brandon's finest business blocks this morning, now a steaming ruin. The bodies recovered are those of Miss McCort

and Clarence Walker. When the fire broke out, Walker was on a street car. He rushed from it into the burning building to the aid of some of the employees, and his body was found not far from that of Miss McCort, in what had originally

been the office. The fire broke out from an unknown cause, in Doig, Rankin and Robertson's departmental store, and spread so rapidly that many of the lifty employes had to jump from the third storey windows. In fifteen minutes it was all
