GEORGINA COUNCIL

Council met at Pefferlaw on Monday, June 29. Members all present. A contract was let to Bituminous Spraying and Contracting Co., Ltd., to retread one mile and 60 feet of road from Mossington's Bridge west to the Townline at 55.4c. per square yard, total \$5916.72.

Resolutions: A deputation from the Lake Shore Road waited on the Council re change Sibbald-Wetherall—that a vote be given the ratepayers of the Twp. of Georgina as early as possible on this log or diverting the road from Mossington's Bridge east to the Stone Church, and that the deputation forward the Clerk plan of same.

Sibbald-McDonald—that the Clerk order from the Department of Highways one car Rotar "B" (5000 gals.) and one car Rotar "RT" (8000 gals.). Cars to be shipped on instructions from the Bituminous Spraying and Contracting Co., Ltd.

Sibbald-Tomlinson—that a grant of \$100 be made to the Sutton Agricultural Society.

SOME HOLSTEIN HEIFER.

A very high record for a two-year-old, has just been completed by the Holstein heifer, Hollingsby Sylvia Alcarita, bred by Redman Bros., Concord, and owned by R. Ray McLaughlin, Oshawa. Her production in 318 days was 18,104 lbs. milk containing 706.25 lbs. butter. In each of four months this heifer was in milk she produced well over a ton, with a top of 2310 lbs. containing 69.30 lbs. fat.
