



ADMISSION TO MEETINGS

The Hon. Anne Swarbrick, the Minister for Culture, Tourism and Recreation will give the annual awards to innovative public library programs at the Sunday evening plenary session, 8:00 p.m.in the Metropolitan Ballroom East. Displays by the winners will be at the "Libraries Advance Ontario" Space Walk on Friday evening. Etobicoke, Cornwall, Niagara Falls and Thunder Bay Public Libraries are being honoured.

EXPO '95

The hours for what has become the largest library trade show ever held in Canada are: Saturday, Jan. 14 11:30 am-5:00 pm Sunday, Jan. 15 9:00 am-2:00 pm The value of prizes and drawings at EXPO '95 is significantly higher this year with the specially expanded show. Guidelines for the Preparation of Resolutions

The following guidelines are addressed to individuals and units preparing resolutions to come before the Ontario Library Association Annual Meeting Sunday afternoon at 2:00 p.m.

- Resolutions must be complete so that, upon passage, each becomes a clear and formal expression of the opinion or will of the assembly.
- (2) Each resolution must clearly indicate the initiating individual(s). If the individual(s) is (are) acting on behalf of and/or under the direction of a group or groups, the affiliation must be specified.
- (3) Each resolution should address no more than one topic or issue.
- (4) The terms used in each resolution must be readily understandable or be specifically defined.
- (5) The intent, objective, or goal of the resolution must be clear. The resolution must state whether it sets forth a general policy, an OLA viewpoint, or a call for specific action.
- (6) All resolutions must clearly set forth their relationship to libraries and/or librarianship.
- (7) If a resolution calls for specific action or a course of action, the resources that the initiator(s) of the resolution believe to be needed in order to carry out the directive must be specified.
- (8) If the initiator(s) of a resolution is (are) aware of a conflict between a policy or directive set forth in the resolution

- and existing Ontario Library
 Association policy or directive, the
 same resolution must indicate a
 possible means of resolving that
 conflict.
- (9) If a resolution calls for a specific action or program and has a timetable, the timetable must be clearly specified and be potentially achievable.
- (10) If a resolution is addressed to or refers to a specific group or groups, this must be clear.
- (11) Resolutions to the Annual General Meeting must be submitted to the Resolutions Action Group by 8:30 a.m. on Sunday. Groups whose business meeting occurs after this time may bring their resolutions to the Group immediately after said meeting.
- (12) Each resolution must have a mover and a seconder. The mover and seconder or their designates must attend the Resolutions Action Group meeting to speak to their resolution.
- (13) The mover and seconder of the resolution or their designates must be prepared to speak to the resolution at the OLA Annual General Meeting.
- (1) Any member in good standing may prepare a resolution for the Annual Meeting.

The staff of the Association and the OLA's Resolution Action Group will be glad to assist a member or unit in the preparation of resolutions. Final wording will be distributed at the OLA Annual General Meeting.

93RD ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the ONTARIO LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

November 5, 1993.

Chair: Allison Craig, QLA President. Parliamentarian: June Elaine Wilson.

1. ESTABLISHMENT OF A QUORUM.

President Allison Craig called the meeting to order. President Craig indicated that most reports for the meeting were lost in the van stolen from the Association at the start of the conference. The meeting was asked to offer its advice as the meeting progressed.

2. ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA.

MOTION: That the agenda be adopted. Moved/Seconded by John Lewis/Peter Rogers. CARRIED.

3. MINUTES OF THE 92nd OLA ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

MOTION: That the minutes of the 1992 OLA Annual General Meeting be distributed in the next InsideOLA for future approval.

Moved/Seconded by Harry Nesbitt/Linda Helson. CARRIED.

4. BUSINESS ARISING.

No discussion.

5. REPORTS OF THE DIVISION PRESIDENTS

The report motions were all presented in the traditional manner requesting acceptance into the minutes of the OLA Annual General Meeting of the actions taken by each Council's Annual Meeting. Motions were presented by

OCULA. Moved/Seconded by Lorna Rourke, Marilyn McDermott.

OLITA. Moved/Seconded by Ian Heckford, Brian Bell.

OLTA. Moved/Seconded by Hazel Thornton-Lazier/Harry Nesbitt.

OPLA. Moved/Seconded by Wendy Brown/Lynne Jordon.

OSLA. Moved/Seconded by Linda Helson/Martha Summers.

OLA Guilds. Moved/Seconded by Ursula Benoit/Cindy Cooper.

The meeting decided to cover the lack of printed reports by dealing with the above through the following motions:

MOTION: That the reports of all division and guild councils be received for acceptance into the minutes of the 1993 Annual General Meeting.

Moved/Seconded by Peter Rogers/Edmundo Vasquez. CARRIED.

MOTION: That reports of all division and guild councils be reprinted and distributed in upcoming mailings of the Association.

Moved/Seconded by June Samaras/Jim Neill. CARRIED.

6. REPORT OF THE TREASURER

President Craig explained that the Treasurer's Report was in the hands of Lenny Goldberg who was, for personal reasons, unable to attend the meeting. The Report was not lost. Because of the Treasurer's absence, there remains no way to link the audited statement with the Association's future financial plans. Executive Director Larry Moore indicated that the resulting situation is unacceptable for rational discussion of the Association's serious financial condition. It is unfair to expect the membership to act on the audited statement without seeing the Treasurer's report and having the opportunity to discuss his analysis. Questions were raised about the continuing absence of the Treasurer and about the need for a mechanism to back up the Treasurer. President Craig stated that every elected officer must accept the responsibility associated with the seriousness of the role taken and that the concept of backups is inappro-

MOTION: That discussion and acceptance of the audited statement be deferred until OSLA's Ideashop Conference in January, the documents to be published in advance.

Moved/Seconded by Gord Thomson/Ann Mackenzie. CARRIED.

Former Treasurer Gordon Thomson questioned the time frame in which the audit had to be developed and suggested that a review of the process be considered.

MOTION: That the Finance Committee review the mechanism for producing the annual audit.

Moved/Seconded by Wendy Brown/June Samaras. CARRIED.

MOTION: That the accounting firm of EvansMartin be appointed as auditors for the fiscal year 1993 - 1994

Moved/Seconded by Janice Hayes/Linda Helson. CARRIED.

7. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

OLA Executive Director Larry Moore indicated that the Annual Report would be published with the current *InsideOLA*. It will include the financial statements, the reports of all officers and the Executive Director, as well as a summary of all Council reports. Full Division and Guild reports will be published in the appropriate newsletter. Moore told the meeting that the stolen van had been found by police just prior to the start of the meeting. Staff member Toni Porter was on her way to the site to determine whether conference registration records were stolen or intact. Members will be immediately informed if any specific action is recommended by police or the banks.

8. THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

The President's Report will be printed in November as indicated. Allison Craig observed that the analogies she had used in her inaugural address last year had proved to be more prophetic than she really intended them to be. Her rules for skiers had all come into play at one time or another during her eventful term as President. The last rule of never skiing alone

proved to be the most important and invaluable. She thanked the OLA Board, the membership, the Executive Director and OLA staff for their constant support and creative input.

Liz Hoffman echoed her words and expressed admiration and appreciation for the job that the staff and volunteers had done in carrying out the conference without the support of records and materials lost in the stolen van. There was warm applause.

9. MEMBERSHIP PROPOSAL.

Two new membership categories were introduced for member consideration. The Transition Membership gives a member who loses his or her library job up to two years of full membership at no cost and special breaks on programs and events where the member might meet those who could be of assistance.

MOTION: That the Transition Membership as proposed be accepted.

Moved/Seconded by Paula de Ronde/Cindy Cooper. CARRIED.

A lifetime membership costing \$1,000 was also introduced. Its purpose is to help Association cash flow through the current difficult period.

MOTION: That the Lifetime Membership as proposed be accepted and that its continuance be reviewed on an annual basis.

Moved/Seconded by Linda Helson/Cindy Cooper. CARRIED.

10. RESOLUTIONS:

OSLA brought forward a request to have an implementation clause entered into the OLA By-Law that would allow development of a block membership plan for teacher-librarians. The school view was that such a block would provide numbers needed to increase the influence of OSLA and OLA in defending the need of a group of members whose jobs are in considerable peril. The proposal under consideration was expected to increase revenues or at least break even. A request for an outline of what the actual proposal would look like sparked discussion from the floor. Arguments against the motion focused on the undesirability of any kind of block approach, since it was seen to lead to an inequity in fees paid by individual members across the Association.

MOTION: That the OLA By-Law no. 1 include:

"Personal members who are employed by an individual school board may be grouped in a block for alternative fee consideration."

Moved/Seconded by Linda Helson/Martha Summers. DEFEATED.

MOTION: That the OLA By-Law no. 2 be clarified by the removal of the words "The treasurer and" in clause 3.b.

Moved/Seconded by Linda Helson/Martha Summers. CARRIED.

During discussion of the following motion, Vice President Janice Hayes took over the chair to allow Allison Craig to leave the meeting.

MOTION: That OLA initiate the development of the Ontario Council for Public Information as proposed by Stan Skrzeszewski at OLA's International Forum on the Transformational Effect of the Electronic Highway

Moved/Seconded by Wendy Brown/Lynn Jordon.

CARRIED.

MOTION: Be it resolved that thanks be extended to the entire 1993 Conference Planning Committee: Peter Rogers, Conference Co-ordinator; Gerda Molson, Conference Manager; Joan Carruthers, OCULA programs; Ian Heckford, OLITA programs; Edmundo Vasquez, OLTA programs; Ann McKenzie, OPLA programs; Giselle Whyte, OSLA programs; Cindy Cooper, Guild programs; Janice Coles, volunteer co-ordinator; Flora Miller, Roger Smith, Exposition co-ordinators; Bruce Walker and the students of Lakeport High School, audiovisual services; June Elaine Wilson, The OLAStore; Paula de Ronde, Melanie Coulson, Beth Ridler, Linda Helson, "Libraries Advance Ontario" Walkabout; Kathy Frizell, Lynda Reid, information desk; Joan Robinson, Janice Hayes, Paula de Ronde, fundraising; David Payne, OLA conference office; and OLA staff members Theresa Lung, Toni Porter, Maureen Cubberley, Jefferson Gilbert and Larry Moore for a job well done under extraordinary circumstances. 12. INTRODUCTION OF THE 1993 - 1994 OLA PRESIDENT

Janice Hayes discussed the wide range of difficulties facing libraries of all types at the present time. She reviewed the rising tide of possibilities and challenges being presented by technological development and what must be learned if we are to have a say in the future shape of our institutions and our jobs. She saw the OLA as being a vehicle for change that has become immensely stronger in recent years; she intends to address the critical questions facing the profession through a variety of programs that will make OLA leadership even more vital and important to our future. She acknowledged the valuable support for her Presidency given and to be given by the CNIB Library for the Blind Executive Director Rosemary Kavanagh and the Library's Board chaired by Wil Vanderelst.

14. MOTION TO RECESS.

3. REPORT OF THE TREASURER

President Craig invited the OLA Treasurer to present his report and the financial statements of the Association. Treasurer Goldberg invited questions about his report and the financial statements. In response to questions about what was being done to retrieve the deficit showing in the financial statements, 1993-1994 OLA President Janice Hayes assured members that the Board was in serious discussion about this and planned to move on a number of fronts, most notably with the Super Conference in January 1995 and with corporate fundraising in the interim. Questions about the timing of the Super Conference and the difficulty for public library boards who are just coming out of their fiscal year were noted. It was pointed out that auditors would not allow 1994 moneys to be used if the Conference was to take place after January 15. Executive Director Moore told the meeting that the Conference dates were January 13-16.

MOTION: That the Treasurer's Report be accepted. Moved/Seconded by Ron Dyck, Lenny Goldberg. CARRIED.

MOTION: That the Financial Statements be accepted. Moved/Seconded by Paul Walker, Lenny Goldberg. CARRIED.

4. NIAGARA DECLARATION.

President Craig indicated that the Niagara Declaration, a planned public statement on the role and value of libraries and librarians, originally intended to be a joint event of the New York Library Association and the Ontario Library Association was now past the point of sensible implementation. The statements developed by various units of the Association for inclusion in the Niagara Declaration will be turned back to the OLA Board of Directors for use in a future document to be decided by the Roard


5. COALITION FOR PUBLIC INFORMATION.

ACHIEVING PREFERRED LIBRARY FUTURES

Richard Dougherty, former Library Director at the University of California at Berkeley and at the University of Michigan; President, Dougherty and Associates.

Do you feel your organization is losing control of its future and is being driven by economic and technological forces beyond its control? How does an organization manage the turbulent change that is rapidly becoming a way of life? This seminar will assist participants in imagining their "preferred" futures and in exploring ways to achieve those visions.

The method used in the workshop was devised by Ronald Lippitt, a founder of the Institute for Social Research at the University of Michigan. The process helps participants examine the future without getting bogged down by existing day-to-day problems. It is organized into multiple steps. The initial steps

include a brief review of what has been accomplished in recent years, current developments, and identifiable trends.

The process, according to Dr. Dougherty, is not an effort to predict what the future will be but, plainly and simply, to imagine what one would like it to be. The process forces participants to identify the obstacles that could impede progress. It is possible to transform images of preferred futures into elements of an action-oriented plan.

Dr. Dougherty has done this workshop for university librarians and provosts to considerable effect. He indicates that there is usually great interest in the process and he will make a point of explaining techniques where it seems to be of interest.

Dr. Dougherty has a long and distinguished record of successful innovation. An early advocate of strategic planning and an adopter of nontraditional services, he has more recently worked with academic officials and librarians to visualize preferred futures.

As libraries become access "ramps to the information highway", they must develop policies similar to those developed for information in traditional hard copy formats, such as print publications and audiovisual materials. 




