It is the responsibility of local library boards to take the lead in providing library service in their communities. However, for many reasons, boards often lack the wherewithal to do this well. To help boards develop the necessary skills and to provide them with useful information and support, OLTA, as the representative body for library boards, is forming a Professional Service Group to document best practices, to develop benchmark standards, and to provide professional services to library boards.
