



Michael Uslan



Michael Uslan is best known as the originator and Executive Producer of the *Batman* movie series, starting with Tim Burton's 1989 film, and continuing to the recent *The Dark Knight Rises*. Less well known is that the first *Batman* film was the culmination of a decade long effort by Uslan to bring a serious, dark version of the character to the big screen. Uslan's start in the world of comics was as unlikely as his success in bringing *Batman* to the theaters.

Born into a blue collar family in New Jersey, Uslan was instilled at an early age to find work to be

passionate about. Knowing he loved comics and films, he set about creating a career.

While attending Indiana University, he successfully created and taught the world's first accredited college course on comic books. The class took an academic approach to the folklore of comic books. A media storm ensued, improbably leading to a job at DC Comics for Uslan.

As an authority on comic book history, he has authored *The Comic Book in America, America at War: A History of War Comics* and *Mysteries in Space: A History of Science Fiction Comics*. He has also authored a children's book *Chatterbox: The Bird Who Wore Glasses* and the acclaimed graphic novel *Batman: Detective #27.* In 2008, Uslan lent his expertise to the Starz documentary *Comic Books Unbound*, which explores the popularity of comic book heroes in Hollywood and how they have transitioned from print to screen.

Uslan has received an Emmy for *Where on Earth is Carmen Sandiego*?, the Independent Spirit Award, The Hoagy Carmichael Creative Achievement Award and The Distinguished Hoosier Award.

Uslan holds a Doctor of Jurisprudence, a Master of Science and a Bachelor's Degree from Indiana University. He lives in New Jersey with his wife. They've been married for 38 years — a Hollywood record.



Learning Commons, Library design THRIFTY WAYS TO TRANS-FORM INTO A LEARNING COMMONS

Changing your environment can signal a change in philosophy. The Near North DSB elementary and secondary school libraries have made dramatic changes on limited budgets. 

Alison Head, Executive Director, Project Information Literacy What Is it Like to Be a College Student in the Digital Age? Since 2008, as part of our ongoing national study at Project Information Literacy (PIL), we have surveyed more than 11,000 students at over 41 colleges and universities in the U.S. We have investigated how college students say they find information and conduct research — their needs, strategies, and workarounds - for solving information problems that occur during course-related research and in their everyday lives. We have found the large majority of students we have studied across all types of higher-education institutions still attend college to learn, but many are lost in a thicket of information overload. They struggle with managing the IT devices that permeate their lives. Our findings indicate that nearly all students intentionally use a small compass for navigating the ever-widening and complex information landscape they inhabit. Alison Head, PIL's founding director, discusses key takeaways from the PIL studies and their implications for teaching, learning, work, and community in the 21st century.

Alison J. Head, Ph.D. is the Executive Director of Project Information Literacy (PIL), an ongoing research study in the U.S. She is also a Fellow at Harvard University's Berkman Center for Internet and Society and the Harvard Library's Innovation Lab. Alison has a Ph.D. and MLS from U.C. Berkeley's Information School and was a Visiting Scholar at Stanford University. Her research interests include information-seeking behaviors of early adults, information literacy and lifelong learning, Web adoption and diffusion, and usage of social media for collaborative learning.



Thomas Frey: The Future of Libraries



Library customers are beginning to view the "relevancy" of their library through a different lens, and their perception of what a library is and how it can add value to a community is evolving. Sault Ste. Marie Centennial Then and Now Calendar

Sharon Wigney & Kevin Meraglia, Sault Ste. Marie Public Library

The library participated in the year-long celebration of our City's 100th anniversary of incorporation as a city in 2012, by highlighting our archive photograph collection. After research, 13 photographs were selected giving an overview of the city in 1912. We then took photographs of the same scenes as they appear presently and assembled the calendar with the two images and a brief history for each month. The success of this project has yielded great interest from the community and we are hoping to repeat this project in upcoming years to highlight other photographs from our archives.

Engaging Patrons: Fightback on the 2012 Toronto Budget

Maureen O'Reilly, TPLWU Local 4948

Libraries and librarianship are under attack but popular resistance has been strong. The Toronto Public Library Workers (TPLWU) Local 4948 (CUPE) lead a successful community fightback campaign to the Ford administration's 2012 austerity budget. Learn more about the tools of the campaign, the players – including Toronto literati, and the suspenseful vote at city hall that ended in a successful conclusion.

OLS-North and SOLS Joint Research Initiative on Province-Wide ILS

Ghyslain Sabourin, OLS-North

This joint initiative will investigate the implementation of a provincial ILS to be shared by small public libraries in Ontario. There are two main components. First, an environmental scan will gather information on successful ILS consortia arrangements including membership and governance; implementation strategies; and funding models for future sustainability. Second, an online survey will be created where over 260 Ontario public libraries serving populations of 50,000 or less will be asked to indicate their preferences for participating in a provincial ILS and how it could best suit their business needs. The project will be communicated to interested public libraries and questions answered during the poster session.

Doubling Down: An analysis of and recommendations for Wilfrid Laurier University Library's online teaching and learning programme

Michael Steeleworthy, Wilfrid Laurier University Library In Spring 2012, The Wilfrid Laurier University Library undertook a review of its online teaching and learning strategy. This examination included an analysis of the library's teaching and learning goals, tools, and organizational structure, a literature review of current theory and methods in online teaching and learning, and a survey of instructional librarians at post-secondary libraries across North America. Our results, which call for more self-service learning options, a stronger online presence for librarians, and a renewed organizational structure for online instruction, are informing the Library's wider restructuring as it moves toward a student-centered, digital-oriented service model.

Information literacy program innovation using blended learning course redesign models

Andrew Colgoni, McMaster University

Blended learning requires a fundamental course redesign to effectively integrate both face-to-face and online elements. Using a project management approach and course redesign models from the National Center for Academic Transformation (NCAT) in the U.S., McMaster University Library implemented a blended learning pilot in five large enrolment undergraduate classes with existing information literacy components, with the goal of enhancing learning outcomes and reducing face-to-face information literacy instruction across the library system by 50%. Using results from instructor focus groups and student online surveys, we will assess this innovation in terms of project management, learning outcomes, workload, technologies and partnerships.

Crisis Culture in Librarianship: How We Are Digging Our Own Grave and Why

Sajni Lacey, Student

This poster provides an overview of the discourse currently available on the crisis culture in librarianship and tries to understand why librarians have consistently predicted the demise of the library and librarianship over the past few decades. A brief examination of the literature points to fears over the economy, advancements in technology and communication within the profession have developed this crisis culture. An analysis of what this means for the future of librarianship and what we can do to improve this discourse indicates that librarianship is in a period of tremendous change with enormous potential.

How to integrate the ILS system, Social Media and Subject Guides

Cindy Li, University of Regina

There are many different ways to manage subject data in library system. But how to integrate them, make them work together and have one stop access for patrons is a big challenge. This poster will use one example –GIS (Geographic information system) research project to show the steps. The display will include how we export data from Voyager, import into Pinterest, and then link to LibGuides which is followed by twitter and links with LibCal. Faculty and students will access GIS resource and related event in one place. It is helpful for research and study.

Better late than never: Using clickers to engage the (not-sonew) freshman

Vincci Lui, McGill University, Macdonald Campus Library What's a librarian to do when their annual in-class visit gets postponed due to a packed syllabus? Every October, freshmen at McGill University's Macdonald Campus are given an overview on how to effectively use library resources and services. Last fall, this usually carefully-timed orientation session was pushed to later in the term - after some students had already attended another library workshop, and well after their first library visit. Find out how the use of flexibly-structured Power-Point slides and an interactive clicker polling strategy uncovered library misconceptions, empowered students to determine session content, and addressed knowledge gaps.

Creating a Virtual Branch Using Wordpress

Stephen Wood, Grey Highlands PL

When creating a new website, Grey Highlands Public Library (GHPL) chose to use the Open Source Content Management Software WordPress to create an interactive web experience that provides the same level of service as a physical branch would. Using Instant WordPress, GHPL developed a new branch website offline on a flash drive before making it "live". The new interactive website provides a cutting-edge experience for our patrons that is easy for staff to maintain and upgrade. Open Source software allows public libraries to create an easyto-access interactive virtual branch.

Virtual Orientation to Services for Students with Disabilities Susan Ewing, York University Libraries

Student engagement, recruitment and retention are critical issues in the post-secondary environment and this applies equally to students with disabilities. Increasingly we are turning to instructional videos that can be accessed online anytime and anywhere. This poster will highlight the work carried out to date on a video project by York's Academic Innovation Fund. A joint venture between Counselling & Disability Services and York University Libraries, the end products will assist both prospective and current students in navigating their way across campus to various services and in using accessibility software (e.g. Kurzweil).

"Practice Makes Perfect" - Building Interview Skills Speed-Dating Style

Kate M. Johnson, Data Consultant, MaRS Data Catalyst, MaRS Discover District

Information professionals are dynamic and diverse in their knowledge and skills, which means that effective communication in a job interview is crucial to landing the position. The "Practice Makes Perfect" project draws upon a speed-dating format and provides participants with a safe and friendly environment to build their confidence and experience in answering interview questions. Participants have a set time to answer typical interview questions in pairs, rotating to a new partner after receiving feedback. Learn how to set up your own "Practice Makes Perfect" session and foster an environment of collaboration and constructive feedback among your fellow information professionals.

Collection Development for Aboriginal Communities: Providing Alternative Format Materials through the CNIB Library Partners Program

Theresa Power, CNIB

In 2010, CNIB received two years of funding from the Ontario Government which supports the delivery of CNIB Library services to Ontarians with print disabilities offered through Ontario's public libraries, including First Nations libraries. The CNIB Library developed its collection of aboriginal literature to meet the needs of Partner libraries working within aboriginal communities. Wasauksing First Nation Public Library, a CNIB Partner library, embraced the aboriginal collection and uses it to enhance its services for clients with print disabilities. See how the CNIB Library developed this innovative collection and how it is being used and marketed in this Partner Library.

Use online forms in library activities

Jennifer (Cong Yan) Zhao, McGill University

Google Docs forms have been widely used in the library for many purposes, such as collecting registration, feedback, and suggestions. This poster goes beyond that and presents three explorative practices of using online forms to communicate with patrons at McGill University: (A) marketing library services to faculty by creating a checklist using a Google Docs form, (B) assessing students' information literacy needs by an online pretest form, and (C) getting consensus on the ranking of journal subscription suggestions within the department by a LimeSurvey form. Issues of using online forms will be discussed.

InsideOCULA goes online and interactive

Martha Attridge Bufton, Jenaya Webb, Elizabeth Yates, OCULA Members

How do you create an interactive online publication designed

to engage Ontario's academic library community? Our web migration team will unveil the exciting results of this challenge and describe the steps we followed in preparing InsideOCULA's extreme newsletter makeover. We'll discuss the importance of planning and documentation, explain the process of working with OLA's new content management system (iMIS), and share our successes and lessons learned. The demands of distance collaboration among team members in Ottawa, Hamilton, and Toronto will also be highlighted.

Info Health: Anatomy of a Successful Health Information Program

Cathy Simpson, Niagara-on-the-Lake Public Library There's an abundance of health information, but determining if it's reliable isn't easy. In response to this, Niagara-on-the-Lake Public Library partnered with their local family health team and medical school to bring their community timely and accurate health information. Info Health focuses on healthy living, disease prevention, detection and management and navigating the healthcare system. The monthly programs reach a live audience of 30 to 50, are broadcast on local cable and available to borrow on DVD. Learn how you can start and run a successful health information program in your community.

All Our Sisters National Forum - Shoebox Stories

Heather McDonald, London Public Library

Come and hear about the three year journey of the London Public Library participating at a national level while engaging with the people that are often most misunderstood. This community led project enhanced partnerships while providing a voice for women who have experienced homelessness. All Our Sisters National Forum was the first national multidisciplinary conference addressing the social, economic and practical issues affecting women who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. Learn why the London Public Library decided to dedicate resources and take on a leadership role in a project whose mission it was to initiate and engage through dialogue, research and lived experience.

It's Virtually the Real Thing

Karin Davidson-Taylor, Royal Botanical Gardens Imagine being able to connect with experts globally without having to go further than your local library. Videoconferencing is an innovative technology that enables you to interact in real-time with cultural organizations as well as other libraries throughout North America and beyond. Explore how you can collaborate with other libraries, provide engaging education sessions for patrons including seniors and children, or extend this service to community organizations. School and academic libraries can support and enhance teachers' lessons with curriculum connected interactions. Come with your questions and leave with enthusiasm to discover how you might use videoconferencing in your library.

Beyond Literacy: Exploring a Post-Literate Future

Kate Restivo, iSchool, University of Toronto Reading and writing are doomed. Literacy as we know it is over. Welcome to the post-literate future. Beyond Literacy is a thought experiment which explores the possibilities of a postliterate future - a future in which literacy (reading and writing; visible language) has been displaced, replaced, or exceeded by a new or evolved capacity, capability or tool. It is also an experiment in scholarly communication (www.beyondliteracy. com) and pedagogy. Created by University of Guelph librarian and instructor, Michael Ridley, in conjunction with graduate students at the University of Toronto's iSchool, the project was co-published by ACRL and OLA.

ESL Cafe at Hanover Public Library

Agnes Rivers-Moore, Hanover Public Library Hanover Public Library partnered with the Adult Learning Centre in Walkerton to offer English Second Language Coffeehouses to the newcomers in the area. We offer a monthly venue for new Canadians to meet, socialize, practice English conversation, and exchange information about experiences in Canada. Refreshments are provided and the information that our guests exchange is priceless. Many do not know where to turn to discuss assorted problems – shared information and peer support help them cope. Library staff attend and help with information. This is a highly popular program, and makes an enormous difference in people's lives.

Entering the Academic Honesty Milieu: Strategies for Success Susan Shepley, Sheridan College

What role can a library play in advancing the academic integrity of its institution? See how Library & Learning Services has been leading academic honesty initiatives at Sheridan College and the impact these have had at both the program and administrative levels. We'll share practical strategies for implementing a suite of learning tools that can transform an institution's approach to policy development, prevention and intervention strategies.

Getting ready for RDA: a modular approach to training Library staff

Emma Cross, Carleton University Library

Resource Description and Access is the new content standard coming this Spring 2013. Libraries will need to address training for staff in all Departments on how to interpret, catalogue and use RDA records. This poster will analyze training needs faced by most libraries and offer a practical guide to implementing RDA applicable to libraries of all sizes. Emma Cross is a member of the Pan-Canadian Working Group on Cataloguing with RDA and the poster will be based on her experiences planning and delivering RDA training at Carleton University Library. Google vs Databases : Comparison of Information Retrieval Systems

Marg Baltzer, London District Catholic School Board We have access to an unprecedented amount of electronic information. In general, it appears that most people have come to rely on search engines as their preferred information source. Librarians and other key stakeholders prefer to access information from subscription based databases. In an objective, evidence based approach we evaluated the effectiveness and efficiency of search engines and databases. The results show a statistically significant difference in search results that will assist key stakeholders to make more informed decisions.

A central place to manage system problems

Grace Liu, University of Windsor Leddy Library

Do you have a central place to report and track system problems? Have you had complaints on service delay? In November 2011, our library developed a new procedure adopting an email account as the primary contact for library staff to report system problems. In previous practice, such reports went to individual technicians' telephones, emails or expressed directly by knocking door-to-door. It was very hard to track problems and ensure consistent quality services. This new procedure enables the library to document systems problems and allocate resources more efficiently. This poster will share our success and experience with the new procedure.

Back to the future? a Team-based approach to Collections

Linda Graburn, University of Guelph Poster presents a case study on the implementation of an integrated Information Resources team of librarians responsible for all aspects of collection development, management and assessment. As opposed to the more common "liaison" model of distributed collections responsibilities, the advantages of an integrated, dedicated team lie in the areas of shared decision-making, improved book plan design, greater potential for research collaboration, and easier management of workload and professional development opportunities. Additional benefits of this staffing model include improved ability to deal with the challenges of dwindling budgets, support interdisciplinary research, resolve access issues, and meet provincial "Institutional Quality" assessment requirements.



Information-Seeking Behavior of Nurses at Health Sciences Matthew Tremblay, Health Sciences North Library During 2012 the Library conducted a survey of the informationseeking behavior of nurses, including a large group of newly hired, recent nursing graduates, and close to 100 current nursing staff. We developed our survey tool based on questions found in the literature. The responses showed the most popular sources of information for both new hires and current nurses, and the systemic issues nurses face on the ward in accessing information. Results reveal similarities and differences between the two nursing groups, and offer an interesting comparative to findings from the literature.

Logic models: a novel approach to communicating library value Alan Gale, University of Guelph

The University of Guelph Library has adopted a "logic model" approach to describing and evaluating its services. Logic models are widely used in the broader public sector; much less so in academic libraries. This poster will discuss the development of models for the Information Resources area of the Library, including the performance measures used to evaluate the services. A prototype logic model will be presented. Logic models offer a practical, flexible approach to the evaluation of library services. The discussion process that underlies their development was a wonderful opportunity to jointly review and incorporate best practices into current library processes.



WORD OUT: Teen Summer Reading at TPL

Lisa Heggum, Toronto Public Library

WORD OUT is an online teen summer reading program organized and run by the Toronto Public Library. Started in 2009, the program has continued to develop new and innovative ways to engage youth interest in reading, writing and literary culture. We're excited to share our successes with the 2012 WORD OUT program. We're also interested in exchanging strategies and best practises for engaging youth readers online with youth services staff from around the province.

Advanced Studies in Partnerships: Building Bridges Between MLIS Students and the Community Librarians Without Borders

Katherine van der Linden Librarians Without Borders McGill is a group of socially minded students in the McGill School of Information Studies. By working in a partnership with the Native Friendship Centre of Montreal, students have a chance to develop their professional skills while benefitting the community. The main goal of this project is to create a resource centre which will respond to the needs of the aboriginal community of Montreal, as well as of students from Quebec's CEGEPs and universities. One of the primary tasks here is the development of a classification scheme which will be culturally appropriate yet accessible to our clients.

Edmodo Project: Thunder Bay Catholic DSB District Champions

June Rysinski, St. Paul/ Corpus Christi Schools This session will showcase the Edmodo Project that the TBCDSB Teacher-Librarians developed over the past two years. Presenters will demonstrate how this social learning tool has enhanced professional learning, developed teacher-librarians' own PLN and allowed for differentiated instruction. Learn how you can use this Web 2.0 tool for content sharing as well as enriching student engagement and success.

Catering to Immigrants in Public Libraries in the Province of Ontario

Marta Mazur Rusak, Christine Smith, Xenia Kurguzova; MLIS Students, McGill University

Immigrants have always been an integral part of the Canadian cultural fabric and their successful integration into society will continue to be an important subject in Canadian policy making. Public libraries are essential community centers and can be a key to promoting successful integration. Our project investigates immigrant communities from a variety of ethnic groups and assesses the available services provided by public libraries to immigrant populations in the metropolitan areas in the province of Ontario, with the final goal of uncovering and further developing successful strategies for public libraries focused on reaching Ontario's growing immigrant population.

Tapping Motivation

Erin FitzGibbon & Claire Peters, R.H. Lagerquist Sr. PS; Sawraj Boparai, Burnt Elm PS, Gloria Henry O'Brien, Mount Pleasant Village School

In our Teacher Leadership Learning Program we explored the use of Inquiry Based Learning and Technology as tools for tapping into student motivation. Our display will discuss the results, challenges and immense learning that occurred for us as teachers and a librarian during this project.

Tell me what the poets are doing: Investigating the library usage habits of the Toronto poetry community

Carey Toane, York University

Poetry readership habits of adults have not been widely researched in English-language scholarship in recent history. We surveyed the Toronto poetry community to ask: What are the characteristics and patterns of English-language poetry readership in this city, and how are these connected to public library usage and events? Framed in reader studies, the findings address the blurry lines between reading poetry for leisure, professional development and studies; public library usage habits and attitudes; bookstores, home collections, and reading series to assess the respondents' feelings, actions and motivations – and their implications for libraries and librarians.

Humber READS storms Facebook!

Aliya Dalfen, Humber College

Humber READS was launched as an interactive orientation activity designed to entertain, educate and excite students about library collections. Students had the opportunity to recommend their favorite READ during orientation week and have their picture taken, or upload their own photo of their recommended READ on Humber Libraries' Facebook Wall. This was a highly successful community building event, introducing college students to the library in a fun and unconventional way. This orientation activity sets the backdrop for a leisure reading campaign in an academic environment.

Virtual Learning Commons: A place for students, teachers and families to DISCOVER – COLLABORATE – CREATE

Patricia Sutherland, Upper Canada District School Board Launched in September 2012, the Upper Canada District School Board's Virtual Learning Commons (VLC) provides an online space for students, teachers and families across the district to discover, collaborate and create. The VLC re-imagines the online library environment by providing not only access to information resources aligned to the curriculum and support for the development of information and digital literacies, but virtual, collaborative spaces for discussion and the creation of learning communities. The VLC also promotes the use of technology in education and provides a place for the showcasing of studentcreated knowledge products.

ILS on a shoe-string budget: open-source software in a nonprofit organization

Zachary Osborne & Jolene Bennett, Toronto Botanical Garden Library

Without the budgetary means to purchase proprietary software or hire consultants, the Weston Family Library at the Toronto Botanical Garden embarked upon an ambitious project to migrate its catalogue from InMagic to Koha, an open-source ILS platform. In building a new catalogue, the many challenges were handled through collaborative learning and support from Koha's online community. This poster describes the win-win process of using volunteer talent in a tight labour market to create an ILS in a non-profit organization. By recruiting library technician and librarian volunteers, the library gained its necessary catalogue upgrade, and volunteers gained incomparable and marketable experience.

Using iPads for Proactive Service @ Markham Public Library Agnes Gorgon, Markham Public Library

In July 2012, staff at Markham Public Library's Thornhill Community Centre Branch piloted an exciting project, which oversaw integration of iPads in proactive customer service. Information staff volunteers used the iPads (original & iPad2) throughout their scheduled shifts, utilizing the tablet for a variety of tasks, including: information service, displays, customer education and storytime. The poster will highlight the project's highs and lows, successes and failures, as well as showcase the training and implementation process, and consider future potential.

Grimsby Grows Seed Library

Adrienne Charette, Grimsby Public Library

Learn about the Library's Grimsby Grows Seed Library project. Started with the support of the Niagara Community Foundation and the Richmond Public Library in California, library users borrow vegetable seeds to plant at home. They are encouraged harvest seed from their plants to be returned to the library for the next growing season. Find out how the project was started and how and why you might want to start a seed library at your library.

Copyright, Open Access and Pedagogy: Course Pack Study at Queens and Stanford Universities

Kim Bell, Queens University

Our poster reports findings of a collaborative study between Queen's and Stanford Universities. During 2010/2011 investigators at both institutions conducted content analyses of printed course packs to determine the percentage of course-pack content that was available to our institution's users through online collections or open access agreements. Study investigators identify three equally important but analytically distinct reasons for exposing redundancies: A) Unnecessary additional cost to students; B) Potential for copyright infringement; and, C) Inhibition of student interaction with key online/digital research interfaces. Results are surprising, and strongly suggest the need for further multi-institutional investigation to bring course reading offerings in line with student cost considerations, copyright law, and educational priorities.

Sense of Place – Does your community have a Sense of Place?

Kimberly McMunn, Hastings Highlands Public Library Hastings Highlands Public Library hosted record numbers at their first Municipal Cultural Planning Conference in June of 2012. Keynote Speaker Gord Hume, firmly stated: "Culture is not a Frill" and "Hope is not an Economic Development Strategy". This event was the perfect opportunity to share how Hastings Highlands has found their Sense of Place and are capitalizing on it. Working together, the Municipal CAO and the Library CEO are building community capacity through cultural collaboration. It's a win-win situation and opportunities are abundant.

Academic Libraries Engaging the Entrepreneurial Community

Chung Hyun-Duck, Helen Kula, and Christina Kim; University of Toronto Libraries, MaRS Discovery District The 'entrepreneurial community' on campus may encompass staff and students involved in entrepreneurship curricula, campus incubators, faculty and student entrepreneurs, technology transfer staff, and others. Drawing on interviews across the province, presenters will highlight some of the ways that academic librarians are supporting entrepreneurial communities across Ontario. Share your questions and experiences in providing information services for this growing need on campus.

Much Ado about Shakespeare: Developing Shakespeare and Theatre Literacy at the Library

Amanda Wilk, Haliburton County Public Library As with literature, theatre holds the power to take viewers on a journey, in which they are able to witness worlds separate from their own, and gain a greater understanding of the society they are a part of as well as themselves. The reading, acting, and debating of theatrical works is a literary skill that is being cultivated at Haliburton County Public Library through the creation of a Shakespeare Club. This poster highlights the development of this Shakespeare-based program, and discusses the important role theatre can play in public library environments.



Making a Journal Club Work at Your Library

Nancy Collins, University of Waterloo

Ever considered starting a journal club with colleagues at your library? The Librarians' Association at the University of Waterloo has been running a journal club for library staff for over two years now and it has been amazing for staff professional development – so easy, inexpensive, and great for encouraging communication and sharing across the library system. Library staff choose articles from the library literature to read and then discuss during informal meetings. Many of the articles and meetings have focused on topics that have actualized into new initiatives or directly connected to areas of current interest within the library. It has been a great way for staff to keep current with developments in the field and explore new ideas. This poster highlights the ins and outs of journal clubs and describes how to start and maintain a successful journal club at your library.

Strengthening Medical Library Services in Ethiopia:

Sandra Kendall, Mount Sinai Hospital

In response to the Ethiopian Government's aim to train 5,000 specialist MDs and PhDs and 10,000 Masters graduates by 2018, the Toronto Addis Ababa Academic Collaboration (TA-AAC) was established to co-build capacity and sustainability in graduate programming at Addis Ababa University (AAU). Enhancing Library Sciences at the College of Health Sciences, AAU is essential to successfully support the expansion of graduate programming. The program for clinical medical librarians will build capacity in library literacy skills, including the accessing of up-to-date information, with foundational knowledge and appraising the evolving literature in evidence-based medicine (EBM) and critical thinking skills to support medical faculty and trainees. UofT medical librarians provide onsite training at AAU over a series of visits starting in 2011 to reinforce and sustain newly acquired medical library skills.

From Research Help to Ask Us - moving away from walk-up reference

Jim Brett & Doug Horne, University of Guelph Library In September 2012 the University of Guelph Library began to pilot a new service – Ask Us! – a multi-tiered service the front end of which is a prominently located triage desk where users can ask any question they may have. More in depth help may be obtained by referrals to 20-minute appointment-based research help sessions or to hour-long consultations with a librarian. The Ask Us! service has dramatically changed the way the Library approaches reference and information services. We're doing things faster, more efficiently, and the feedback we're getting from the community is fantastic.

Connecting the Community through Literature: Launching One Book, One Markham

Leah Rucchetto, Markham Public Library In growing and diverse communities it is crucial that community members have opportunities to connect. The library can play an important role in strengthening the community. This poster session explores the steps that Markham Public Library took to plan its first ever community-read. Learn more about selecting two books; how we involved over fifteen community organizations in our planning; targeting programs to align with Library Board and City priorities; delivering our programming; what we have been able to take away from our experiences; and the innovative ideas that we will build into One Book, One Markham 2013.

Copyright and Canadian Academic Libraries

Marni Harrington, Western University

A current review of the state of copyright in Canadian Academic Libraries will be presented. In recent years, copyright has become a major issue for universities and colleges in Canada. Many institutions have had to confront copyright issues and make serious decisions about the future of copyright in their libraries. Successful information literacy and instruction is dependent on librarians' ability to access and share information. Alternatives to licensing and publishing will be discussed and copyright issues from 2010 to present will be reviewed and presented.

Searching for the library at Fanshawe: how students access the library website

Tony Onorato, Fanshawe College, Library & Media Services Can students find your library's website? Even if you have invested resources into creating a great library website, students won't use it if they can't find it! During our 2012 website redesign, we examined the number of user actions required to access the library from Fanshawe's homepage. We compared this to the number of actions required at other Ontario colleges, plus forty-six other partner institutions. Usability testing, student feedback and the corresponding research have discovered a gap in accessing the library at Fanshawe and other Ontario colleges. In doing so, we are deterring and disenfranchising students from accessing the library, when we should be creating more user-friendly access pathways, to draw students away from non-academic resources.

Effective promotion planning for your library

Brittany Coulter, Western University

Successful library events most often depend on deliberate and well-planned promotion. The backbone of planning is having an easy-to-follow protocol for consistent promotion of upcoming events. Promotion protocols facilitate tacit knowledge transfer and ensure compatibility of events to the overarching mission of the institution. Taking examples from event promotion in a special library, we highlight the details of a recently developed and implemented promotion protocol. By way of highlighting aspects of marketing, public relations, advertising and promotion, we present our protocol to be transferred to any type of library.

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In an increasingly social world, Susan Cain shifts our focus to help us reconsider the role of introverts — outlining their many strengths and vital contributions. Like A Whole New Mind and Stumbling on Happiness, Cain's book, Quiet: The Power of Introverts In a World That Can't Stop Talking, is a paradigm-changing lodestar that shows how dramatically our culture has come to misunderstand and undervalue introverts. 



When the mall that housed stores, a food court. and the public library in Elliot Lake collapsed last June, the tragedy started a storm of questions and comment from the news media. Other examples of emergencies that might put library trustees and staff in the public glare include natural disasters, patron protests over perceived censorship or permissiveness, budget controversy, or confrontation over policies on the use of the building.

tant Gail Hulnick walks us through crises faced by libraries around North America, and examines the responses that work and those that don't. Boosting Your Brain: The Restorative Benefits of Interacting with Nature

Marc Berman, Rotman Research Institute at Baycrest

Imagine a simple intervention than can improve memory and attention with nearly zero cost. According to Attention Restoration Theory (ART; Kaplan, 1995) interacting with nature can improve psychological functioning in significant ways. Results from a series of experiments will be presented that show how simple interactions with nature (such as a walk in a park) can be beneficial for human psychological functioning, validating ART and providing a way for all of us to unplug from our information rich world.



DID YOU KNOW?

The French presence in Ontario dates back nearly 400 years to the establishment of the Mission of Sainte-Marie-Among-the-Hurons (Simcoe County) in 1639.

Today, after four centuries, Ontario's francophone community numbers 582,690, i.e. 4.8% of the province's total population (according to Statistics Canada 2006 census). It represents the largest francophone community in Canada outside of Quebec.

The distribution of the francophone population in Ontario is as follows: 41.5% of francophones live in Eastern Ontario; 28.7% live in Central Ontario; 22.5% live in Northeastern Ontario; 5.9% live in Southwestern Ontario; and 1.4% live in Northwestern Ontario.

Like the general population of Ontario, the Franco-Ontarian community is diverse and vibrant. For many years, it has welcomed francophones from Africa, Asia, the Middle East and Europe. Today, francophone racial minorities represent 10% of the province's Francophone population. Ontario's Francophonie is a dynamic community because of its many institutions and associations in the fields of education, culture, health, justice, the economy and communications.

Franco-Ontarians have access to a school system that spans from junior kindergarten to high school. High school graduates may study in French at one of three French-language colleges (University of Guelph's Alfred College, Collège Boréal, La Cité collégiale) or at one of six Ontario universities that offer instruction in French (York University's Glendon College, Collège universitaire de Hearst, Dominican University College, University of Ottawa, Laurentian University, and Saint Paul University).
