
#### Grant Announcement

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### OCULA Summary Powerful Pedagogies

Nididas Taylor (standing in for Jennifer Jenson) gave an entertaining presentation on the characteristics of commercial and educational games, providing lots of examples from the most popular games and touching on research "hot spots" such as gender, violence, and what people learn in (commercial) games. "Contagion", a role playing immersive game project that teaches how diseases move through population is a good example of how to take the commercial "play" aspects and put them to use in education. # OHLA Summary The Hiring Game

Candidates and interviewers for jobs have the same desired result: finding the best candidate for the position. A wealth of information about interviews exists for both sides of the interview process. So how best to impart this information at a conference that is focused on creative connections and innovations? With a game show approach to learning, of course!

Based on an idea and articles written by New York State librarian, Elizabeth Irish, Janice Pividor of the London Health Sciences Centre assumed the persona of a game show host (without the usual hugging and kissing) and led the audience through a rendition of "The Hiring Game," loosely based on the Family Feud format. With the able participation of volunteers from the audience who formed 2 three-member teams and others serving as scorekeeper and a "Vanna White" co-host, the rest of

the audience not only appeared engaged but were laughing and nodding throughout.

The rules were almost identical to the TV version with just slight variations to account for time and content. Each team picked a captain to start the game and to speak on its behalf. After four questions, the team with the highest score played the fast answer round and a winner was declared. Janice added commentary to each question to complement the answers and those who remained in the audience provided interesting observations from their personal experience.

Those "in the game" received prizes donated by staff at London Health Sciences Centre. But ultimately we were all winners. Interviewers benefited from new questions and ideas to bring to the interview experience and candidates learned what employers are asking and what they are looking for!

## OSLA Session Summary

The Toolkit for Student Success workshop was about how evidence-based practices, the "OSLA Toolkit", can provide data and evidence that school library programs can link to student success.

Some of the ideas shared were: keeping records of how collaboration with teachers; "knowing and

showing" how school libraries help students; research shows that TL's make a difference; preassessment of students and post-assessment to gather and document evidence; make things fun (for both staff & students); school staff will need to see TL's involved in the assessment side of learning; TL's running reading programs (such as Read Across Canada, Get Caught Reading, etc.) TL's must reflect and refresh our programs.

## Friday's OPLA Highlights

Increasingly library staff are serving more diverse community groups, staff need to have information on the practices and protocols of a variety of faiths. **Session 1027**, *Managing Religious Diversity in the Library*, will provide the tools needed to help boost librarian confidence to serve these users.
