Thankfully, it was all worth it.


Australia is almost as if it's hiding at the bottom of the world just waiting to be discovered.

If a person or public body does not make submissions at a Public Meeting or make written submissions to Halton Region before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted, the person of public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.
