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becomes increasingly more difficult, Chetrat has already identified areas in which he can improve.

"In watching the (world trials) race, my turns under water are not as fast (as they should be)," he said. "I'm going to be working on getting stronger to muscle things out and get my turns where they need to be."

Chetrat said his performance at the trials "leaves me wanting more." That has to be welcome news to University of Toronto coach Byron MacDonald, who already has no doubts about Chetrat's desire to do whatever he needs to in order to achieve his goals.

"Zack is such a workhorse, he can take a hard workout and turn around the next day and give you a great race. He's a tough, tough guy," MacDonald said after Chetrat's record-setting performance at the Ontario University Athletics (OUA) championships. "He might be too tired to set a record but he'll give you everything he has."

That's exactly what Chetrat did for the Varsity Blues this season. He won gold medals in the 100m and 200m butterfly at the Canadian Interuniversity Sport championships and added a bronze in the 1,500m freestyle and 4x200 freestyle relay.

That came on the heels of a dominating performance at the OUA championship where he broke three long-standing individual records and helped the Blues break another in the relay. His accomplishments earned him the University of Toronto male athlete of the year, continuing a streak of Oakville swimmers to win the award. His Oakville Aquatics Club teammate Marco Monaco won the award in 2008. Colin

The 20-year-old White Oaks grad said it's not always easy balancing training and studying, but he issued himself a challenge.

"This year I wanted to step up and see what I could do while I'm still in school," Chetrat said. "Sometimes it's tough when you have exams and mid-terms. Sometimes school suffers, sometimes swimming suffers. A lot of the guys racing (on the national team) are not in school. They don't have that added stress and you see when they get a break from school, they see a big jump (in performance)."

Chetrat, now in his third year, has two years remaining due to a lighter course load to accommodate his training with John Rogers at the high performance centre at U of T.

While the Olympics may still be a work in progress, Chetrat will represent Canada at the World University Games in China in August. He said the opportunity to compete at international events helps him when it comes to representing his school.

"When you've been around the world and faced a lot of different situations, it helps keep me level headed," he said. "Some people let nerves get the best of them. That experience helps you eliminate them and perform how you want."

With an important year ahead of him, performing how Chetrat knows he is capable of will take on added significance.
