## **Bennett an NCAA champion**

ark Bennett didn't score any goals for the Union College Dutchmen in the NCAA men's college hockey tournament.

For that matter, he also didn't draw any assists, throw any body checks, block any shots or kill any penalties.

But don't suggest to the 22-year-old Oakville native that he was any less part of Union's first-ever NCAA championship win than defenceman Shayne Gostisbehere, who had a plus-7 rating in the Dutchmen's title-clinching 7-4 win over the top-seeded Minnesota Golden Gophers Saturday in Philadelphia.

At Union College, a 2,200-student liberal arts school in Schenectady, N.Y., they don't measure individual contributions by statistics. In fact, Bennett said, they don't measure individual contributions at all.

"That's the one thing I've noticed here since Day 1. Once people take their equipment off, no one treats you any differently - whether you're the MVP

or the captain or the fourth-line guy. Everyone is the same value. We band together. No one's bigger than the team," said the former Oakville Blades forward, who played 22 games this season but none since Feb. 22.

"I think our captain, Mat Bodie, said it best. They asked him what it's like to be captain of a championship team, and he didn't talk about 20 guys. He said 27 guys. It doesn't matter if you play two minutes, five

minutes, 10 minutes. This is for all of us, and everyone's a part of it."

That mentality helped Bennett deal with the disappointment of seeing limited action once again with the Dutchmen. Two years ago as a freshman, Bennett missed six weeks of the season due to mono. Last year, he sprained his MCL early in the campaign and never completely recovered, suiting up in just eight games.

This season, he battled hip issues and once again

never felt 100 per cent. While Bennett struggled to find his game, Union — one of just three schools to appear in each of the past four NCAA tournaments, along with Minnesota and Boston College certainly found its. The Dutchmen went undefeated in their final 18 contests (17-0-1), making it difficult for Bennett to work his way back into the lineup.

"(Not playing) is something that is definitely hard to deal with. At the same time, I love hockey and I love being around the guys. At this level, it's so much more than being on the ice during the games. I'm with these guys 24-7, I live with them, have class with them. We're at the rink for two hours a day," said Bennett, who has four goals and

seven assists in 50 career games at Union.

"The lineup we had at the end of the year kind of got into a groove. When you're winning, it's easy to go along with it and easy to smile," he added. "It's a great feeling to be a national champion. It's a heck of a lot better than losing six weeks ago and already being into training season."
