children's activities area are also available. In its inaugural season, the Renaissance Festival attracted more than 25,000 visitors over 13 days, with estimates for this year


reaching the 60,000 mark. Ticket prices, which include taxes, are \$16.95 for adults, \$15.50 for those aged 62



lyrics he had written, and I left the room...to get my guitar. And I started putting the melody to the lyrics," del Puerto recalls, noting that that particular song is now titled Dreams and is the seventh track on their first CD.


