 this study will not directly address the congestion that we are currently experiencing on the road networks in Oakville. However, the study will make recommendations that are directly related to traffic movement in the study area, in Oakville and the through traffic from outside our municipal borders. It is well recognized that congestion is not peculiar to Oakville but is present throughout South Halton and the Greater Toronto Area (GTA). The Region of Halton has already completed the Regional Road 5 and 25 Corridor Strategy which includes widening Dundas Street to six lanes and makes provision for HOV (High Occupancy Vehicle) Lanes. The Greater Toronto Services Board (GTSB) is developing a GTA Transportation Plan. It is also the direction of the study to

· Oakville's Economic Strategy identified the need for creating a business environment in Oakville that would attract complimentary businesses and industries to meet the needs of the already existing business community in Oakville. Creation of land areas that would accommodate business parks, office buildings, warehousing with good access to markets and road networks in Ontario, other provinces and to the United States. An example is Zenon which has already relocated their Head Office from Burlington to the area around Dundas Street and Bronte Road. This company works throughout the world installing their technology for treating waste water.

Process being rushed?

• as indicated before, it has taken 10 years or more to designate the lands north of Dundas Street as an urban area. Items related to HUSP can be viewed by accessing Halton Region's own website www.region.halton.on.ca. The planning for North Oakville began with the LGL Study which took over a year. The current North Oakville Land Use Options study was begun in June of 1999. There have been two Public Information Meetings to date. There is also a Community Resource Group that has met on two occasions to review the same material that has been presented at the Public Information Meetings. The next Public Information Meeting will be held on May 18th, 2000, and the final report will be presented to council at a Public Meeting on June 26th, 2000. All meetings are held at the Town of Oakville offices on Trafalgar Road.

Can't we just say NO to anymore

Growth in Oakville?

• the Town of Oakville tried to say NO and limit growth in the mid-1970's. This decision resulted in the Developers and Landowners referring the plan to the Ontario Municipal Board. The decision of the OMB in 1978 resulted in approvals for the growth we have seen in Glen Abbey, River Oaks and Iroquois Ridge North. There is still land in these communities which can be built on but inquiries from Developers and Landowners are being made to the Town for lands that are owned north of Dundas Street.

If an application is received for an Official Plan Amendment and Zoning Bylaw for any of the lands north of Dundas Street, the Town must deal with the application within 90 days according to the Planning Act. If the Town doesn't meet this

timeline, the owner has the right to appeal his plan to the Ontario Municipal Board for a decision. Without a Plan, Oakville is at a disadvantage and could risk losing control over how, when and where growth starts to occur on the lands north of Dundas Street.





NOTICE OF SECOND PUBLIC INFORMATION CENTRE

In order to address growing traffic congestion on Third Line and to enable coordination with the Ministry of Transportation's (MTO) design of the QEW Third Line interchange, the Town of Oakville and MTO are carrying out a study of Third Line from Wyecroft Road to Upper Middle Road in accordance with the requirements of the Ontario Environmental Assessment Act. The study is addressing the EA requirements for both Third Line and the interchange with the QEW. McCormick Rankin Corporation (MRC) has been retained to carry out the

Following the first public information centre on March 1, 2000, the study findings and preliminary proposals for Third Line were reviewed taking into consideration comments received from the public, property owners and government agencies. The preferred alternative is shown on the key plan and includes:

the widening and reconstruction of Third Line to 4 lanes plus median with turning lanes at intersections as required

a new interchange at the QEW with Third Line going over the QEW.



A second public information centre has been arranged to review the comments received to date and the preferred alternative for Third Line. The information centre is scheduled for:


