These five guys have developed a distinctive sound that is all their own, making it obvious how they managed to rocket from near obscurity to a certified four times platinum in Canada.

"A lot of what our shows are based around is that dynamic play of intensity where you can take it down to a whisper, then you can feel the tension

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building up and then the song explodes and the crowd comes along with you on that ride," said Makoway.

Living up to those sentiments, the crowd at the Oakville Waterfront Festival held on tight for that ride as they followed the intense musical journey Moist took them on, absorbed by every second of it.

Moist took the crowd one step further as an hour after the show, they thrilled fans by coming back outside to sign autographs and talk. It looked doubtful at first, but Oakville gave Moist a great reception and they appreciated the genuine fans that waited around.

"From the very beginning, before we were even signed, when record companies weren't so interested in us, we saw that the audience was understanding what was going on, there was some sort of connection between us and them," said Usher. "And as long as that's happening, then things will be okay with us.'

And I obviously wasn't the only Presley music fan who was willing to give Kabakos a chance to strut his stuff. The Boardwalk Stage in Bronte was surrounded by anticipating fans; and they were not disappointed.

Kabakos, a handsome young man in his early 20s, maybe didn't swivel his hips in quite the same way as the king of rock 'n' roll, nor did he beat on a guitar hanging around his neck, but he sure could gyrate to the beat of his background band's '50s/'60s music, and his voice resounded in an Elvis pitch that was almost uncanny, especially during the ballads.

And even though a costume change into an army uniform got a few squeals from the young adoring females in the crowd, his allleather pants, vest and jacket elicited howls and whistles.

But Kabakos took it all in his stride, flashing that crooked Presley grin and tossing his head to tousle the tall comb of hair that

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every Elvis fan recognizes until it lightly touched his forehead.

Kabakos' repertoire included songs like Heartbreak Hotel from Presley's early rock 'n' roll days to his Blue Hawaii movie days and on to the My Way days of his final live concerts.

But I have to admit to being disappointed that the young tribute singer didn't choose to include my all-time Elvis favourite Are You Lonesome Tonight or my companion's favourite Don't. However, he did appease me somewhat with his sensual version of I Can't Help Falling in Love with You (my second favourite 'King' classic).

Kabakos' impression of Elvis certainly made a lasting impression on the throng at Bronte's Boardwalk Stage on Friday night as he was enthusiastically applauded to perform an encore, after wiping his brow and promising to talk to enthusiastic fans off-stage.

This talented young tribute artist will be returning to Oakville on August 14th and 15th. So, he suggested, for those who need another "Elvis fix," he will be appearing at 8 p.m. both nights at the Oakville Centre for the Performing Arts.
