

FURTHER ABOUT THE INDIAN.

PARTICULARS OF THE WRECK.

We have intelligence to day from a variety of sources about the Indian and her passengers. A Telegraph from Windsor to the New York associated press, gives the names of the cabin passengers, all of whom have been saved:—

Hon. Mr. Bottsford, Mr. Meldrum, Mrs. Meldrum, Mr. Patterson, Mrs. Patterson, Mr. Street, Mrs. Street, Mrs. Elliott. The following is the list of steerage passengers, ten of whom, we grieve to say, were lost:—

SAVED.—A. G. Howland, Francis, Kalster, wife, and four children; Mr. Eickman, Richard Brown, G. V. Roman, William Cross, J. Mann, A. Borgesson, W. Mason, and Mr. Pierson.

DROWNED.—Wm. J. Moses, wife, and two children, Mrs. Eickman, and child, Alex. Dean, Jas. Dixon, Thos. Chano-house, and Wm. Johnson.

The Hon. John Ross, and Mr. McKellar, were not passengers. There were only 38 passengers, and the crew numbered 85. We are not informed whether any of the latter have been lost. The following gives some particulars of the accident, which ought to have been furnished before. The telegraphic arrangements in Nova Scotia are a disgrace to that province:—

HALIFAX, via Sackville, Nov. 26. The war steamer *Gladiator* has returned to Halifax with the remainder of the survivors of the *Indian*.

The ship has totally broken to pieces, and only a small portion of her stern is visible.

Very little of her cargo has drifted ashore, and it is so damaged as to be worthless.

Complaints are made of the robbery and plunder of the passengers by the natives and legal inquiries will be made.

The mails have been saved and forwarded via Windsor, in care of the purser. She had eight cabin, and thirty steerage passengers. The latter are mostly Gentlemen and Hungarians.

The cargo consisted of two hundred tons of bale goods, one hundred tons of iron, and the balance coal.

The ship ran on a ledge while on a speed of eight knots an hour. The weather at the time was hazy but not thick.

The Captain was deceived by the soundings, and supposed he was off Cape Sable. When the vessel struck she tore off her bottom and filled almost instantly. The engineers opened the valves of the boilers, thus preventing an explosion.

Boats number one, two, and three, were got out and lowered, when a sudden crash took place, and the vessel parted amidships.

The steerage passengers now made a rush for the boats, and sunk numbers one and two, drowning the engineers, some of the crew and passengers, and two women and children.

Boat No. 4, under the command of Mr. Smith, the second officer, was blown off thirty miles.

Boats Nos. 5, 6, and 7 were sunk or damaged.

Mr. Tibbet's, the fourth officer's boat, reached the shore.

Mr. Bigham's, the third officer's boat, broke adrift, leaky, and it was supposed was lost on the shore.

The Purser, with the mails and passengers saved, left Halifax on the 26th, to come to Portland by way of St. John's; they were expected there (Tuesday) morning. The *Hungarian* will call at Halifax and take home the officers and crew.

A young lady passed through Cincinnati last week on her way to St. Louis, whither she had been forwarded by Express. She was from Paris, and being ignorant of our language, her friends had placed her in charge of an Express messenger. The "way bill" was made out in due form, and the charges paid as her tariff. The messenger declared that he never took such good care of "freight" before, considering it extra, we presume. Who wouldn't be an Express messenger?
